Now don't get me wrong – Naples, Italy is a fantastic city, but there was only one seminarian, out of the almost 200 living at the North American College, who ever wanted to visit Naples – and this was only because he had relatives that lived there. Naples is a beautiful city. Situated on the Gulf of Naples, on the western coast of southern Italy – from its harbor, Naples has the picturesque, silhouette of Mount Vesuvius. And yet, nearby towns like Sorrento and Positano are easily more beautiful. No one visits Naples for her

beauty. Being the 3<sup>rd</sup> largest city in Italy and the 7<sup>th</sup>-most populous urban area in the European Union, there are **many**, **many stores** to shop in – and being a port town, they say, "**if you can't find it in** Naples; you don't need it." But with so many people, Naples is a **cacophonous clamor** that assaults one's ears, and its traffic jammed streets means it has plenty of **pollution**. Want to view art? Visit the Chapel di San Servo on the via del Sanctis – a Church converted to a **sculpture museum** - it houses the Veiled Christ of Giuseppe Sanmartino (a veil sculpted out of rock that is **translucent** to the battered body of Jesus taken down from **the** Cross). But why go all the way to Naples for beautiful sculpture when Rome's **Borghese Museum** has so many more and so much

great sculpting. I'm only saying, that when we had a free-weekend, as seminarians in Rome – no one ever bragged about spending a Saturday and Sunday morning in Naples. But there is one **reason** to visit Naples, which no other city in the world **can boast** – and that is: yesterday's Feast Day Saint, St. Januarius! Januarius was a Bishop in the late 3<sup>rd</sup> and early 4<sup>th</sup> century, who was martyred for his Catholic Faith. The Cathedral of Naples houses two ampules of the Saint's blood, which liquify three times a year! It has to be one of the coolest relics in the world. And there is not a zealot around, who wouldn't go to see this **miraculous sight**. Now, many people have heard of Sublette. "Oh, that is where the Toy Show is held," or "that is where Woodhaven Lakes is located." With its lush farm fields of corn or soybeans undergoing senescence and dotted with wind towers – there is a beauty here that cannot be seen anywhere else. Let us face facts though. Nobody is going to come to **Sublette**, Illinois – just like nobody goes to Naples. But what if you were to become a Saint?! If you became a Saint – you would put Sublette 'on the Map' to stay (as they like to say). Tens of thousands of visitors flock to Naples every year just to see the miracle of St. Januarius' blood. If you became a Saint, how many Faithful Catholics would make a pilgrimage to tiny Sublette, just to see where you were born, where you grew up, where you fostered an intimate relationship with Jesus Christ, the Son of God. # Questions on Your Catholic Faith

Why do Catholics ask for the intercession of the Saints instead of just going directly to Jesus Christ?

I have the impression, that sometimes **Protestants** think that we, **Catholics**, are trying to get into **Heaven** by the back door; instead of just using the front door. That by praying to **the Saints**, we are somehow deceiving God. Be assured that, we do 'all' in full view of our Heavenly

Father. In the Third Eucharistic Prayer of the Mass, we pray: May (Jesus) make of us an eternal offering to You (Father), so that we may obtain an inheritance with Your elect (the Saints), especially with the Most Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of God, with St. Joseph, her spouse, with Your blessed Apostles and glorious Martyrs, and with all the Saints, on whose constant intercession in Your presence we rely for unfailing help (emphasis added). The Saints, the best friends of Jesus Christ, are now in God's presence. To have the Saints clamor around God for our intentions, like children would gather around their Dad and beg him for a father's blessing—that is the image we should have when it comes to the intercession of the Saints. Remember that episode of the Brady Bunch (TV show), where Peter broke his Mom's favorite vase? Well Peter would **not confess** to having broken the vase, because he wanted to go on a big camping trip with his friends? In their great love for Peter, all of Peter's brothers and sisters went (individually) and told their parents that they had broken the vase. Parents are never as dumb as their children think they are. Mike and Carol Brady figured out that Peter had broken the vase. Parents are always proud when they see that their children love each other, because every parent knows that they will likely die before their children; and that their children will look out for each other (love each other with familial love) when they are gone. Yes, by Jesus' death and resurrection, God's Son has reconciled us to Himself, and when we eat His

body and drink His blood, we are filled with His Holy Spirit and become *one body, one spirit in Christ* (wording again taken from the **Third Eucharistic Prayer**). My Mom use to cook **multiple main entrees** for a meal when company was coming over. For what if, someone did not like what was being served? God runs things differently in Heaven. The Father only **serves one Food** in Heaven – It is the

Eucharist of His Son. God knows that all His children love

this Heavenly Food, and when the Saints (those who already have the Beatific Vision – they see God) pray that we would join them in the banquet Hall of Heaven – God smiles on this. God knows He taught His children well: that we love each other, that we help each other, that we all wish for our brother and for our sister to go on a camping trip (entrance into Heaven) even though we do not deserve to go, because we broke the vase (sinned)!


