


foes will be terrified and disgraced; all will fall back in sudden shame.

From the Gusset

Our brokenness at having **sinned** and our tendency to keep **sinning** is the reason that God decided that He must send His Son into the world to save us. John the Baptist told the people that they should **repent** of their **sins**, so that the Kingdom of God might come; and when our Lord came, Jesus calls us to repent, because the Kingdom of God has come! – This is the time of fulfillment. The Kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe in the Gospel. (Mark 1:15). Lent calls us to acknowledge our sinfulness and to ask for God's **forgiveness**. There is a group of Psalms called *the Penitential Psalms* – seven voices crying out to God for mercy and forgiveness, and the Popes from as long ago as Innocent III (1198-1216) have called upon the Church to pray these psalms during **Lent**. As there are seven partial weeks in the Season of Lent, I thought we would pray these 7 Psalms together both in these Gusset columns and in my

weekday homilies. Psalm 6 is the first of *the Penitential Psalms*. Scripture scholars think that King David was the predominant author of the Psalms (73 of the 150 Psalms are attributed to David), and Psalm 6 is attributed to this man, whom God called His 'son.' Weary both in body and spirit – a desperate prayer is raised to God for mercy and relief from the punishment his sins deserve – David calls on God to be his Savior. The King knows that he has angered God by sinning against Him, but although David realizes God should punish him severely – he asks instead for God to forgive him. See this is what the first man should have done when Adam sinned against God. But Adam was yet to understand that he was to treat God as a Father,

because God was treating Adam like a son! It often seemed to be during the summer months – when I had more free time on my hands than I knew what to do with – sometimes when I **sinned**, **Mom** would make me tell **Dad** what I had done when **Dad** got home from work. It was with **excruciating anxiety** that I waited for **Dad's** car to pull into the driveway, but I had rehearsed over and over how I would tell **Dad** my sin and at the same time ask for his **mercy**. That is what **David** does in this Psalm, and that is what we should do during **Lent**: acknowledge our sins, confess them to God in the Confessional (when we go to **Reconciliation** to fulfill our **Easter duty**), and ask for God's **mercy** and **forgiveness** and assure **the priest** that we will gladly do penance for our sins, so that we can be like St. Simon of Cyrene and carry the Cross of our sins even if just for a little bit with Jesus, who has graciously agreed to His Heavenly Father to do the **penance** our **sins** deserve. Dante's original title for the Divine Comedy was: "The Comedy of Dante Alighieri: A Florentine by birth; not character." So, the poem was meant to be autobiographical, but we have to wonder why is the word 'comedy' in the title? Well, there were only two works of literature at the time – Comedies or Tragedies. The definition, I was taught was: if the main character dies in the work it is a **tragedy**, but if the main character lives (and can make a sequel) it is a **comedy**. A **comic poem** is one that begins **badly**, but ends **happily**. So even though we start in **Hell**, we know from the title that we are going to head in the direction of the **good**. Now a comedy features a 'comic hero,' who arrives at a happy ending typically through no merit of their own; and this is a hugely *Catholic notion*. You and I were created by God, but created in the image and likeness of the Second Person of the Trinity! We look to God the Father (even if we are a silly girl) like Jesus – the Father's only Begotten Son, the person that God the Father **loves** the most! God made us, so that He could **love** us and bestow His blessings on us! God is so in **love** with you – that the Almighty can think that nothing would be **greater** than to **love** you and receive your love in return for all eternity!! God desires to the last drop of His Son's Blood to make you a Saint in His Kingdom!!! So, Dante's Divine Comedy and the epic poem God is writing about your life are both comedies – God desires that your life on earth end with your entering into **Heaven** and experiencing **happiness** (**Beatitude**) for all eternity!!!! So, even though your life might **not** be going so **good** right now – maybe you are experiencing **depression**, or maybe you have **cancer**, or maybe you just lost your job, or maybe people are sinning against you, or perhaps you have lost a loved one to death and you just don't know how you are going to have the strength to get out of bed tomorrow morning – know that through no merit of your own – God loves you and wants to bring you to Paradise! As Dante will find out for himself – you must know that if you gratefully receive the Sacraments of the Catholic Church; if you allow God's will to be done in your life, and not your own will; if you ask God for **forgiveness** of your **sins** and **joyfully forgive** all, who have sinned against you – you will become a **Saint!** With all this in mind, why not come to our next **RCIA** meeting as we enter into **Hell** with **Dante** – knowing full well – everything is going to turn out **happily!**

Confessions will be heard at 4:30pm and then we will pray the Stations of the Cross at 5:00pm, and pray our Mass at 5:30pm at St. Mary of the Assumption in West Brooklyn on Friday, February 23rd.



The Art and Architecture of our Catholic Churches


How is it that the Catholic Church where one worships God — can be so influential on one's Faith!



The Catholic Church defined – at the **Council of Trent** – that even the tiniest particle of the Sacred Species is the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ, substantially present in the Sacrament. This Doctrine of the Church is given witness to in one of the smallest objects in our Churches the ablution cup! The ablution cup is a small bowl-like container with a cover. which stands next to the Tabernacle and is filled with water. Should the priest suspect that any particles of the Host are clinging to his fingers – he dips his fingers into the water found inside the ablution cup and then wipes them on a **purificator**. The Latin root of this word - abluo - refers to a washing or cleansing. Any liturgical action that consists in washing or purifying of one's body figuratively means one is cleansing his inner self or some object. This ritual washing symbolizes that he must be pure in heart and mind to offer the Sacrifice of Calvary and the priest asks God to give him that purity necessary to **imitate** Jesus Christ. That destructive

raccoon that inhabited the Sacristy of Maytown's Church of St. Patrick, broke the ablution cup in his thirst for water. Long-time parishioner, Judy Sharkey has generously sponsored the buying of a new ablution cup in memory of her beloved husband, Thomas Sharkey, whose

Funeral Mass was at St. Patrick's on October 14, 2023. Made in Poland, our new ablution cup holds 6 oz of water, has a crystal bowl, and is covered by a 24k gold plated cover with a Cross. It is beautiful, and like most of the beautiful things in our Church is very obscure and even, if is looked upon with our eyes – we are often unaware of its sacred meaning. Our Lord often says (even to His own disciples), "do you have eyes and not see? Do you have ears and not hear?" We pray that this Lent that the Holy Spirit would open our eyes and our ears to the wonders of the Kingdom of God that surround us; for truly, Jesus Christ is always present in our Tabernacle – for the Kingdom of God is among us!
