
Talm Sunday March 24, 2024 Psalm 143

From the Gusset

We have dedicated our Lent this year to praying the penitential psalms written by King David. The penitential psalms are like seven voices crying to God for mercy and forgiveness; and one way to look at these psalms is as, if it is the Catholic Church, Herself, whose voice can be heard as She cries for Her children (you and I) to be made a part of the Body of Christ. Psalm 143 does not mention a particular sin that the Psalmist is guilty of, but simply acknowledges that *no one can be just before God*. In other words, we have all sinned against God and neighbor. But more than this, the Catholic Church is always telling us that our real enemy is not our neighbor nor the person who sins against us – and it is certainly <u>not</u> God; but our real enemy is the Evil one. It is Lucifer, who is our enemy – *the one who has pursued our souls and made us dwell in darkness*. Do you see the irony? The Devil was the first Angel created by God and he was so

beautiful, so **luminous** – that God named him, **Lucifer**, which means – *the one who bears light*; and yet, when the Evil one fell from grace, he became ugly and dark – twisted and false. When we sin, we also step into *the darkness* – when God would have us always **dwelling in His light**! **Psalm 143** is talking about the universal battle we are all engaged in – the battle not simply to keep from sinning; but rather, the battle to stay in covenant with God. In the last line of the **Psalm**, the psalmist expects to triumph over his enemy, because "I am Your servant!" WOW! Do you see that this is our **trump card**, which we play to win **the victory** over **sin** and **Satan** and the world – that we will win, because we are servants of God! Remember when the Prodigal Son was *dwelling in darkness* – he had lost all his father's inheritance, he was cold because he had no clothes on his back, he was hungry because he had no food, he was slopping pigs, and nobody cared, if he were to die! It is then that the son hits on the plan that he will return to his father, and ask to be made a servant!! You see, the word 'servant' belongs to the language of covenant- a servant is in covenant with his Lord and the Lord swears to protect His servant's life! You entered into covenant with God the day that you were **Baptized**! You entered into covenant with God on the day you received your Confirmation Sacrament. If you got married, you and your spouse entered into covenant with God when you received the Sacrament of Holy Matrimony. Fr. Randy entered into covenant with God on May 21st in the year 2005 – I was ordained by God as His priestly servant! You and I are in covenant with God in the Sacrament of Reconciliation, so every time we fulfill our end of the covenant and confess our sins to God - God fulfills His end of the **covenant** by **forgiving** His **servant's sins**!! Finally, because you and I received the Eucharist last Sunday – we are in covenant with God!!! By fulfilling our end of the covenant of praying the Prayers of the Mass and believing that Jesus is present in the **Blessed Sacrament** – God fulfilled His end of the covenant by flooding our souls with the **Divine love** of His Son!!!! To say I am a servant of God-to say I am a **Catholic** means I am in covenant with God. I fully expect (I have Faith) that I will triumph over my sins – not because of anything I do, but because the Lord will extend His hand to help me, if only I would seek to put my hand in His.

FINAL RCIA MEETING OF THE SEASON March 26th, 6:30pm in the Hall in Sublette

The Divine Comedy by Dante Alighieri is about the state of the human soul in eternity. What will the souls in hell suffer? How will the souls in purgatory be cleansed of their sins? What does God's love look like when He gives it to His Saints in Heaven? The poem is about eternity, but it is also about the present. The poem is 100 cantos long, but it takes place within the context of a week's worth of time – from Good Friday through Easter week; and when Dante is finished with his pilgrimage, he will be back in Florence in the year 1300 in the middle of this life. And so, just like, Ebenezer Scrooge upon waking from his Christmas Eve dreams;

now, has a chance to live his life **differently** after having been visited by those **ghosts** of **Christmas past**, **present**, and **future**; one of **the fruits** of **the poem** is to help, you and I live our **vocations** here and now, with an eye towards **eternity**. How will we live in the next life – **suffering** the pains of **hell** or experiencing **the glory of Heaven**? When we read **the Divine Comedy**, we are given a **perspective on life** that is reliable and helpful – because it is so easy to lose **perspective** in this life or have a **skewed perspective** on life; and so, we need an **eternal perspective** on the **soul**, on **freedom**, on **love**, and (most of all) on God. That is what **Dante** gives us! – and isn't that really **the greatest gift** any teacher could give to his students, any artist to his audience, or any **priest** to his **parishioners**? – the gift of being able to help us live better **Catholic lives** for **the glory of God**!

Holy Thursday will see us celebrating our last two Masses until the Easter Vigil. March 28th at 11:00am will find us at the Chrism Mass in Rockford's Cathedral Church of St. Peter. This is where Fr. Randy and all the priests of the Rockford Diocese renew our Priestly vows to Bishop Malloy and the holy oils are picked up for use at our 3 Churches in the coming year. In the evening, we celebrate the Mass of the Lord's Supper at 7:00pm at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church. This is where we have the foot washing, and celebrate our Lord teaching His disciples how to consecrate the Eucharist. After a procession of the Eucharist through the Church, our Lord is reposed in the Tabernacle until midnight—at which time to signify our Lord's capture in the garden of Gethsemane and His being taken into prison, before His trial before Pilate on Good Friday—the Eucharist will be taken from us. We are encouraged to watch and pray with Jesus up until midnight. Remember there is no Mass on Good Friday—only adoration of the Cross and a Communion service.

The Art and Architecture of our Catholic Churches How is it that the Catholic Church where one





worships God—can be so influential on one's Faith! All of you have noticed how we removed the Holy Water from the fonts after Fat Tuesday. For all of Lent, we have not been singing the Gloria, we have replaced our joyful Gospel Acclamation with "Praise to You, Lord Jesus Christ, King of endless glory," Fr.

Randy doesn't get to use his beloved **incense** to symbolize your prayers rising to God as a **sweet oblation**, and we have switched over to praying **the Apostles Creed**. Then with **the fifth Sunday of Lent**, we have placed **purple** drapes over our statues and crucifixes. By doing this, we are fasting with our **eyes**, **ears**, **nose**, mouths, and **fingers**, because one of the dimensions of **Lent** is to **fast** – to offer up a small **sacrifice** to show our Lord our great **love** for Him. When we enter into **Holy Week**, our Churches take on an even more **stark** or I would say a **drastic** appearance, especially during **the Triduum** (the three days of **Holy Thursday**, **Good Friday**, and **Holy Saturday**. Following **the**

Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday night, we will strip our altars bare, and this would be a good time to see your Churches' **Altar stone**. If you come to your Church to pray (although **the Blessed Sacrament** will not be in **the Tabernacle** (you will see **the Tabernacle** doors open and **the Sanctuary light** extinguished)) - yet you will see the moveable **Altar stone** cut into the altar! An **Altar stone** is a rock – typically marble – upon which **the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass** is celebrated. This is the spot where **Fr. Randy** places **the chalice** and **the bread** of the sacrifice of **the Mass** for consecration. Consecrated by a **Bishop**, the **Altar stone** is anointed in five places, which are incised with five **Crosses** to symbolize the five wounds of Christ on **the Cross**: two wounds in the hands and two wounds in the feet of Christ, and a fifth wound in the Lord's side – where **the Roman soldier** stabbed Jesus with his spear to see, if the Lord was dead. There is also a tiny cavity, called **the sepulcher**, where relics are placed. **Pre-Vatican II**, one of the relics had to be that of a **martyr**, and interestingly enough, they use to add a few grains of **incense** to **the sepulcher**. This is because of that curious line in the book of **Revelation (6:9):** … **I saw underneath the altar the souls of those who had been slaughtered because of the witness they bore to the Word of God. St. Ambrose said,**

"if He who **suffered** for us all is <u>upon</u> the altar (Jesus); <u>beneath</u> the altar are they who by His sufferings were redeemed – **the martyrs** are entitled to this resting place closest to their Lord!" You would of course be able to see the **Altar stone** at other times of the year; by simply, lifting up **the Altar clothes**; but for a few days, you may directly behold the **Altar stone** and perhaps touch the stone with **a kiss**, to thank Jesus for laying down His **Life** to **ransom** yours!
