Lord, open my lips; my mouth will proclaim Your praise. For You do not desire sacrifice; a burnt offering You would not accept. My sacrifice, God, is a broken spirit; God, do not spurn a broken, humbled heart. Make Zion prosper in Your good pleasure; rebuild the walls of Jerusalem. Then You will be pleased with proper sacrifice, burnt offerings and holocaust; then bullocks will be offered on Your altar.

From the Gusset

Did I ever tell you about the time that I got mistaken from Mother Teresa? I had gotten a call to anoint someone at the nursing home, and as I'm signing in, the priest from across the river is walking into the nursing home as well. Turns out, the family was so hyper-zealous, they didn't want Grandma to die without being anointed, so they called both Catholic Churches in town to give



the sacrament. So this other priest and I are walking down the hall to the residents' room, when I saw a jigsaw puzzle only half put together in the common area. I stopped to fit a few pieces together, (I just can't stand to see an unfinished puzzle), but the other priest kept walking down the hall, and he was talking about something. But when he realized that I'm not walking with him any longer—that he is talking to himself—he stops and comes back to where I am



working on the puzzle. The priest said, "you know Randy you are like Mother Teresa." And I responded, "oh yeah, how is that?" And this priest says, "one time Mother Teresa was walking down the streets of Calcutta and she was being interviewed by a reporter who was asking her all kinds of questions, when the reporter realized, Mother Teresa had stopped to help a poor man lying in the gutter. Whereas, the reporter just kept walking right past the indigent man— he hadn't even seen him." King David says in our favorite Psalm for

Lent, Psalm 51— David says, a heart contrite and humble, O God, You will not spurn. What is a contrite heart? The word "contrite" in Latin actually means: 'worn out' or more accurately 'ground into pieces.' Isn't that interesting? The God of the universe loves the heart that is broken into pieces! God loves a worn out heart. God loves a person that has been trampled in the dust by societies' sins against the person! When God sees that your heart is broken— grounded into pieces— trampled under foot by the world and sin and Satan— God



falls in **love** with you all over again, and God stops to fix your heart, **to recreate it**, to make it beat again with a **love** for the Savior, Who mends your **heart**. You see, just like crazy **Fr. Randy**, who for just one of his many crazy quirks that he has—**Fr. Randy** cannot pass a **jigsaw puzzle** without fitting a few of the pieces together—God is just like that! When God sees your

heart contrite and humbled—broken into a million pieces by the sins committed against you; God stops and He heals your heart. When God recreates you (heals your heart), He makes you better than you were before your heart was broken, because He loves you so much. That is what King David says about God in the penitential Psalm—Psalm 51: a heart contrite and humble O God, You will not spurn!

And when they came to the place called Golgotha, they gave Jesus wine to drink mixed with gall. But when He had tasted it, He refused to drink. Matthew 27: 34

Intellect and will, conscience and freedom – these are the essential elements of a fully human action. Jesus did not want a sedative on Calvary, which would have dulled His consciousness and not allowed Him to remain fully alert to the very end. For without consciousness, He could not have (in complete freedom) accepted the fullest measure of suffering for my sins. When you pray the Stations of the Cross every Friday, you freely choose to come to Church, you bring your full intellect to bear on God's plan of Salvation, and then your conscience, realizing the severity of your sins, you unite the sacrifice of your life to the sacrifice of Christ; and offer a Plenary Indulgence for your beloved. Work a Plenary Indulgence all in one night (Friday, March 8th) by coming to Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church at 4:30 pm and going to Confession, praying the Stations at 5:00pm, and receiving the Eucharist in a state of grace at 5:30pm.



The Art and Architecture of our Catholic Churches

How is it that the Catholic Church where one worships God
—can be so influential on one's Faith!

We start all of our **Stations of the Cross** by praying the prayer of our Lord as recorded in **Matthew's Gospel**: **If any man would come after Me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. (Mt 16:24) The disciples grumbled** among themselves as to who would be the greatest in heaven, and so our Lord's preaching of taking up **a cross** and making yourself **a servant** of all, came as a shock to them. **St. Paul**




world was telling them to live their lives. The world has not changed. The world still tells us that we should <u>avoid</u> suffering. But the early Christians took our Lord's words seriously that they should embrace the daily sufferings of life and accept persecution. Many of these early Catholics went on pilgrimage to the Holy Land, where they could actually walk the path that lead Jesus from His condemnation by Pilate to the small hill of Calvary. After the 7th century, when the Muslims overtook the Holy Land, these pilgrimages became not only arduous, but life threatening. This lead eventually to St. Francis of Assisi erecting Stations of the Cross in local Churches. Now, you and I can make a

pilgrimage to the fantastically beautiful **Stations** erected on the very walls of our own Churches. We can unite our **sufferings** – how we lost our job, how people have slandered our name and

sinned against us, how we are facing anxieties because a loved one has died or is undergoing surgery, how our children no longer practice their Catholic Faith, how it seems no one loves me anymore – we can unite our sufferings with that of our Lord's sufferings as He carries the heavy Cross of the sins of the world to Golgotha to die on that Cross. When we pray the Stations devoutly, the Church loosens her treasury of grace – and we can work a Plenary Indulgence. We deny ourselves, accept suffering in our life, and walk with God's Son toward Glory; whenever, we pray the Stations.
