From the Gusset

The mercy of God is evident throughout the Divine Comedy, but perhaps mercy's high-water mark is in canto 5 in the second Canticle: the Purgatorio. Everyone and his brother who reads the poem believes there is no greater example of God's mercy than on a man named Bonconte. Bonconte was a soldier, who died at the battle of Campaldino on June 11th in 1289 – as he was running away from his enemy, an arrow shot him through the throat. He was unable to speak a single word as his mouth filled with blood – all Bonconte could manage was the fraction of a syllable – simply the letter 'm' sound as he called upon the Blessed Virgin Mary for help. Now Bonconte was an evil man, who hated the Holy Father and had not been to Mass, since he was a boy and his mother made him go. As a devil was coming to take Bonconte's soul to Hell, the devil is



stopped by an Angel, who informs the evil spirit, "No, this one is wanted by God in Heaven!" The **devil** is infuriated, he cries out – "one little tear" at the last second of his life, and God wants this one for Heaven??! "It is just not fair" - the horrid devil shrieks! The point Dante is trying to make is that God's mercy extends even to those who waited until the last possible moment to make peace with God or be receptive of God's love for them! Listen to Bonconte's words: we all were doomed to death by violence, and we all sinned until our final hour; then light from heaven granted us understanding; so that, repenting and forgiving, we came forth from life at peace with God, as God instilled in us the longing to see Him! Just think, we, who pray the Hail Mary Prayer at least 50 times a day, we, who realize the great gift that Jesus gave us on Good Friday – that Mary should be our Mother too; if some arch-sinner like Bonconte can be saved for Heaven by barely calling on Mary's name and at the last possible second – if Bonconte can be saved – we would do well to put all our stock in the mercy of Jesus Christ as well, and call upon our **Mother**. Yet, I believe that God's **mercy** shows itself **greatly** from nearly the first page of the Divine Comedy. For isn't our hero in such dire straits in canto 1 of the Inferno that Dante's prayer is heard by the Blessed Mother, who sends St. Lucy – who in turn sends Beatrice, who then invokes Virgil to go and guide Dante along the path that will bring him back into God's blessings? Who is Dante Alighieri that Mary should send such a great Saint as St. Lucy to go and rescue a single man, who has wandered off the path that leads to Heaven? You see, Mary takes the command from her Son, so seriously – the command: "woman behold your son"—that the Virgin Mary is so much like her Son, Jesus, who says, this is the will of the One who sent Me: that I should not lose anything of what He gave Me, but that I should



raise it on the last day! I keep telling you how special you are to our Lord. God the Father gave you as a gift to His Son, Jesus, the day you were baptized. Our Lord wishes to give you as a gift back to His Father at the end of your life! Have mercy on us, O Lord. Have mercy on us! Happy Easter!!

The Art and Architecture of our Catholic Churches



How is it that the Catholic Church where one worships God—can be so influential on one's Faith!

Perhaps they have **not** shed light on our **altar** and on **the Eucharist**, since before **Vatican II** – this **Easter** saw a one of a kind **double candelabra** light up our altar at **Our Lady of Perpetual Help** in **Sublette**. This past summer, I had been working with **the roofers** to install our **iHub antenna** in **the bell tower**, when I stumbled across this

amazing telescoping, double candelabra. Though quite corroded, I immediately contacted T.H. Stemper company – a third generation company that specializes in statuary and restoration work. Stemper has reguilded Fr. Randy's chalice and repainted the magnificent statue of our Lady at St. Patrick's in Maytown. The Stemper brothers had never seen a double candelabra like ours, and they have been in business since, Grandfather Stemper took over European Statuary & Art Company back in 1911. Regilded in 24k gold – these beautiful candelabra are once again shedding heavenly light upon our Eucharistic Lord, and just in time for the Eucharistic Congress coming to our own backyard in Indianapolis next July. Angels have always been **God's messengers** – that has always been **the Angelic function** – to shed light on God's glory – to inform mankind of God's great love for us! Lucifer and the bad angels would not accept this vocation; however, all the good Angels continue to bring God's grace from Heaven's throne to earth. Candelabra typically have seven candles, each representing the seven Sacraments of our Lord Jesus Christ. The highest candle represents the Eucharist – the body and blood, soul and Divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ. The next two candles that surround the Eucharistic Sacrament are the preparatory Sacraments of Reconciliation and **Anointing!** Then come the covenantal Sacraments that leave an **indelible mark** on our souls: **Baptism** and **Confirmation**. Final the bookend candles are the **Vocational Sacraments** of **Holy** Orders and Holy Matrimony. We know that there are four Gospels, which were written to

showcase the glory of the miracles that Jesus came to die and rise from the dead in order to give us a share in His Divinity. For the reason, we receive the Sacraments of the Catholic Church is to become more like Christ! The double set of seven candles then represent the four Angels that inspired the writers: St. Matthew and St. Mark, and St. Luke and St. John. Part of the uniqueness of our candelabra is that each set of seven candles are connected to a telescoping pole allowing us to raise and lower the reflected brightness that these good Angels shed. They are priceless, which is simply another sign of the greatness of the Catholic Faith of the two dozen or so Catholic Families, who built this glorious Church dedicated to Our Lady of Perpetual Help! I only hope, as your priest, that these regilded candelabra will be a source of inspiration to you, and make you (even more) desire to celebrate the Eucharist every Sunday!
