Twenty-sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time September 29, 2024





The Catholic Tradition teaches us that Jesus is just like us in every way except sin. This means that our Lord had a Guardian Angel just as I do. If I read Sacred Scripture with this notion – that Jesus is being followed around by His Guardian Angel in every instance, then I wind up seeing a different picture. Such as, when I read the agony in the garden. Remember Jesus wanted His three closest friends: Peter, James, and John – to come away from the larger group, of His

12 best friends, and just pray with Him. The three greatest disciples were to help Jesus talk to His Dad. (Because that is what **prayer** is: talking to God.) But the three became drowsy and **fell** asleep; and so, who is our Lord left with? Only His Guardian Angel is there to help Him pray to His Heavenly Father. Remember the big question on our Lord's mind: Father, do You really wish Me to drink this cup? Our Lord's personal will is to let the cup pass Him by? Yet, Jesus wants to do His Father's will. The Savior's mantra has been and ever shall be: 'Thy will be done, Father - not Mine.' Our Lord was given help by the Angel that God had assigned to Him. That is probably our **Guardian Angel's** biggest job – to help us to clearly see what is God's will for our life, and perhaps more specifically – our **Angel** is to keep reminding us of our **vocation** – and remember what vocation is? Vocation is the work God has given us to do. Vocation is the way of life we are to live to glorify God. Vocation is knowing who are the people that we are to help grow in holiness and to go out and do it (make them holy). I experience our Lord's agony in the garden every night before I go to bed. There is no one else around. I'm in my bedroom by myself. I open my breviary to pray Night Prayer (to talk to God one last time for the day). I ask my Guardian Angel to make his presence known to me. I ask my Angel to help me examine my conscience. My Guardian Angel reminds me of my vocation to the priesthood, and so I thank God for allowing me to celebrate the Mass and hold His Son in my hands! My Guardian Angel helps me to see the times I have not lived the vows I promised God on my Ordination day. My Angel helps me to see how some of the people are holier tonight because of what I did (my actions), or what I said (my words), or what I thought (my prayers for them).

My Guardian Angel also points out how some people made <u>no</u> progress in holiness that day, because I was derelict in my duties as a priest. In short, my Angel (just like our Lord's Angel in Gethsemane) always reminds me of God's will for my life, so that I can say like our Lord did: Father, all things are possible for You. Help me to take up the Chalice of Salvation that Your will may be done and not mine."

THE MASS AND THE SAINTS

"Time looks different after the celebration of the Paschal Mystery." —Bishop Daniel Flores

St. Clement of Rome (1st century) reminded his **parishioners** that God had planned long ago <u>how</u> and <u>when</u> His Son would die on **the Cross** and be raised from the dead. That since, God knew the hour and the day that we

also should not be haphazard or irregular as to when the offering of gifts and the public conduct of worship and service of the Mass should take place. This is why Fr. Randy publishes in the bulletin, the time and the Church where he will celebrate the Mass. God told us all, when His Son died and rose from the dead for us, and so we **obediently** tell God, when we will offer up the gifts of our life (the bread and the wine) and ask that they be united to the sacrifice of Jesus Christ! But, specifically, what time of the day ought the Mass to be celebrated? St. Cyprian (died 258) pointed out that the Israelites in captivity in Egypt killed the lamb in the evening hours and sprinkled its **blood** on their door posts before retiring for the night. Bishop Cyprian also quoted the Psalm: let the lifting of my hands be an evening sacrifice. (Psalm 141:2) St. Thomas Aquinas said that normally the Mass must be celebrated in the day, and not at night, because Christ, Himself, is present in the Sacrament, who said, I must work the works of Him that sent Me, whilst it is day: the night cometh, when no man can work. As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world. (John 9:4-5) (See, the passion, death, ascension, and Resurrection was 'the work' Jesus came to accomplish. Ie. the Mass is the work of the Christ!) Since the Passion took place from 9:00am till 3:00 pm, St. Thomas thought that this should be the norm for the praying of the Mass – adding that on a Feast Day, the celebration should take place at 9:00am, since this was when Christ was crucified by the tongues of the Judaeans! The Angelic Doctor thought that the Mass should be celebrated at noon on lesser days, for this is when Jesus was crucified by the hands of the soldiers. On fast days and during Lent, the Mass ought to be celebrated at 3:00pm – when the Lord cried out in a loud voice and gave up His spirit. Dom Gueranger (1805-1875) said that it was at the 9 o'clock hour that the Holy Spirit descended upon the Church, and so the great Sacrifice that becomes Her (Holy Mother Church) ought to be offered at this time. Amalarius (780-851) was a Bishop, who applauded all **priests**, who out of **love**, would not allow the day to pass without offering the Sacrifice to God, and he thought it laudable that priests celebrated the Mass after 3:00pm out of respect for our Lord, whose Will they are only following. Fr. Kramer likes to celebrate the Mass at night, because he is a night owl; and because he is retired and not bound to celebrate the Mass with a congregation – he may celebrate the Mass whenever the Spirit moves him. On my day off, I have celebrated the Mass just after brushing my teeth when I first got up and also, I have celebrated the Mass just before I put my pajamas on to go to bed. As the BTB Bishop from Brownsville, Texas says, no matter when the Mass is celebrated, It always changes the complexion of the world!
