
# Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time October 13, 2024

Mary and Martha are great Saints in Heaven, and so they have eclipsed the town they are from. We focus on the Saint so much more than where they were born or lived or worked. Just as St. Mother Teresa is considered great the world over though everyone knows she worked in Calcutta. Just as Pope St. John Paul the Great is universally known though we all know he was from Poland. All of us American men are so proud of St. Fr. McGivney though we know

this founder of **the Knights** was from out **East**. **Dante** has **St. Martha** looking with great **love** and **holy pride** upon her **sister**, **St. Mary** in the Paradiso, but the funny thing is: **Dante** has **St. Mary** looking up at her **sister**, **St. Martha** with nothing short of **filial adulation**. 



# THE MASS AND THE SAINTS/ VISIO DIVINA

We are supplementing our RCIA reading of The Mass and the Saints book with another book on prayer called: Transformed by God's Word. The author, Stephen Binz will teach us how to pray with Icons using a technique called Visio Divina (Divine Seeing). First off, we are introduced to the ancient technique of Lectio Divina (Sacred Reading). Theologians and the Church Fathers of the West have always encouraged us to personally encounter God through the reading of Sacred Scripture (the Bible). Lectio Divina is a spiritual technique where we don't read the Bible simply to acquire more knowledge, or get advice, or form an opinion about a passage in Sacred Scripture. No, when Lectio Divina is employed to read the Scriptures, we become the object that is acted upon and shaped and formed into the image of Jesus Christ. You see, each of us was made in the image and



likeness of the Son of Man, but our bondage to sin prevents us from looking like Jesus. God's Word is then spoken to us that we might be transformed into the immortal creatures who will live forever in God, because (in the language of Bishop Flores) – we have allowed God to pour all of His Divine Love into us, which makes us think, speak, and act like the Son of God, Himself! The Catholic Church teaches us that Scripture is written under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit. St. Paul would say, "theo-pneustos," which means: "God-breathed!" (2Timonthy 3:16) God did not write the words of the texts, nor did God dictate the words to human beings; rather, human beings moved by the Holy Spirit spoke under the influence of God. (2Peter 1:21) Today, the Holy Spirit continues to breathe life and power into the Sacred texts, so that we encounter the living Word of God and God's breath leads us into a personal, formative encounter with God to the extent that we open ourselves up to their transforming power. The



Spiritual Fathers **encourage** us to involve all of our senses when reading the Bible and to be participants in the scenes of Sacred Scripture – not just 'outsiders' looking in, but 'insiders' allowing God to teach us, change us, make us more like His Son. Binz ends the first chapter by talking about the necessary dispositions you and I must have if we are to allow God's Word to transform us. They are 1) Reverence – the understanding that we are entering into the Mystery of God and we will not always understand God, but we still treasure His Words as Mary did. 2) Openheartedness – that when we open the Bible, we must also open our **hearts** and allow God to **form** us into a greater **image** of His Son. 3) Expectation – we have confidence that God is present and is speaking to us. 4) Faithfulness – it is going to take some time for God to change us – this is a gradual process, but the more we get to know God through our reading of **Scripture**, the more we grow in **love** with God.
