TO BEGIN AGAIN

From the Gusset

"God, it is Your fault that I sin!"

St. Thomas Aquinas offers us the **encouragement**: 'no matter how much one is **afflicted by sin** – one ought always **to hope** that God will give him assistance – that **the sinner** can **trust** in God to save him.' Remember, when God asked **Adam**, why he took the fruit that he was forbidden to eat – God



asks Adam, why did you sin? Originally, there is silence. God calls to the man and the woman in the garden and they did not answer God; rather, they hid themselves from God. Fr. Randy still does not know what to say to God, when I sin. The Prophet Isaiah gives me a new way of speaking to God, especially when I realize how much I have sinned. Isaiah says, "You, O God, have hidden Your face from us, and have delivered us up to our own sins." (Isaiah 64:6) We almost accuse God of allowing us to sin against Him! "You, Lord, are our Redeemer. You are our Father. Why have You allowed us to wander so far from You?! God, it is Your fault that we have sinned!" Wow! You see, this is just one of a thousand reasons that the Catholic Church gives us to attend Mass EVERY SUNDAY! If we don't bring ourselves into God's presence than we will wander further and further and further from God, we will sin more and more. This whole Season of Advent is one of new beginnings — of bringing us closer to God. We know that God is coming (He will be here in the flesh on Christmas), and so we beg God to call to us — we ask for the grace that God would call us to repentance — that God would halt our wandering away from



Him and that we would respond to God by turning around and coming back home, why? Because, Jesus calls us to come back to the Father's house at Christmas. We can blame God for letting us wander from Him (we can blame God for allowing us to sin), and we ask for the grace that God would call us back. Yet, we must then respond to God's call to come home – we must agree to try, with God's help, to begin again to live the life of holiness that God calls us to! Dare to begin again with Fr. Randy this Advent. We will blame God for allowing us to sin so much, and we will beg God to call us to repentance. We will confess our sins at the Communal

Penance Service in Sublette on December 12th; we will allow God to save us from ourselves, and invite us back to His Father and our Father's house at Christmas!

70 Begin Again Advent Penance Service December 12th 6:30pm

This whole season of Advent is about the God, who comes down to us—that we might, one day, be lifted up to Him! That is what the Prophet Isaiah is talking about in chapter 64: Lord, come down from Heaven to save us. God came down first to speak to Moses and then God came down to speak to the prophets, and finally God comes down from Heaven and becomes

flesh—that He might talk directly to us! We might look at it this way: humanities' prayer was finally answered by God—that for so long we prayed: "O God, if only You would break open the heavens and come down." Well, at Christmas, God finally does that—He comes down to earth. The Lord came, only because we finally realized; if Jesus does not come, we will be lost in our own sins. God comes at Christmas to save us from ourselves. What a wonderful time to begin again—to start again! On the night of December 12th, we will have multiple priests available to hear our confession, absolve us of our sins, and give us a penance to pray—that we might show God our joy that He has come to save us from ourselves, from our sins.



THE MASS AND THE SAINTS

There may not be anything more Catholic than the Creed that we profess every Sunday! This is why the working of a Plenary Indulgence has, as one of the 5 actions on the part of the pious soul seeking to obtain the Indulgence, him recite the Creed. Remember, our Lord addressed the soldier, who struck Him, "if I say the Truth to you, why do you not believe Me?" St. Thomas Aquinas says, "since we believe in Christ – that He is the Divine Truth – that after the Gospel is read (as far as the parts of the Mass go), the Creed is sung. By this we show that we give our assent, by Faith, to Christ's

doctrine." It is definitely more pronounced in **Rome** (especially when I was attending a **Mass** in St. Peter's square at which the late Pope St. John Paul the Great was presiding) when the Mass is prayed in multiple languages – perhaps the first reading was in Spanish, the Psalm sung in Latin, the second reading in French, and finally the Gospel in Italian – the homilist had finished and there was a great silence that fell over the crowd of 4,000 plus zealous-Catholics, and finally one could hear the solitary voice of the Holy Father say, "Credo in unum Deum." As St. Albert the Great taught, "the Creed is begun by the giver of sanctity – the Bishop or priest." Not the people, or the choir (because it is sung), but the priest in tones the Creed on Sunday, because the good things of God flow in an orderly way though the various ranks of the Church to the people! Remember, how good Moses said it was, that when he anointed Aaron with the oil that it flowed from his head, to his beard, and on to the collars of his robes! This was a foreshadowing of how good things flow from the priest onto his people – Ie. the priest receives Holy Communion and then he distributes the Sacrament to his people. The rule of thumb (in the old days) for reciting the Creed at Mass was: always on Sunday (which commemorates the Resurrection), but also on the Nativity, the Ascension, and Pentecost – because these Mysteries are spoken of in the Creed. The rule then applies to Feasts of our Lady (because she is mentioned in the Creed), and the Feasts of the Apostles. Here it is interesting to note that the Creed was said in certain parts of the world on the Feast day of St. Mary Magdalen! She being the apostle to the Apostles with her message of being sent by the Lord to the eleven on that first Easter Sunday. The Nicene Creed is sung; whereas, the Apostles' Creed in only recited; this is

because, the Nicene Creed was composed while **the Church** was at **peace** in the world; whereas, the **Apostles' Creed** was



composed during the time of persecution – and so whispered in silence. The Creed, sung or recited, is a defense against the darkness of past and future errors. We believe the Creed to be the Truth spoken by the Bridegroom, Jesus Christ, to His bride, the Catholic Church.
