From the Gusset

"...He emptied himself,...." Philippians 2:7

The **ironic thing** is (if we are **humble** enough to see it), is that we already have *a head start*. We are already **empty**. We are already **poor**. We are already **slaves** or servants. We were born **human**—we were all given the **poverty** of **human flesh** from our birth, from our **conception**. Because we are *human beings*, **fleshy creatures**, and because our **flesh** was made from **the dirt**—we have already been **humbled** and subject to **death**. We already have **a head start** on the Second Person of the Trinity, Jesus Christ! The

Lord God, on the other hand, He is God—Jesus is the Glory of God the Father. Jesus is filled with all the Love of His Father—Jesus is rich beyond all imagination. Jesus is the Lord of all, the Word through whom God created all things, and Jesus has always existed and forever will exist—He cannot die! And so on Christmas 2,000 years ago, the Second Person of the Trinity had to empty Himself— Jesus had to take on the form of a slave—God had to humble Himself and embrace our humanity, and become vulnerable to all things, but most especially vulnerable to death! So Jesus enters the game of Salvation way behind us, you and I are way out in front of God, or we should be way out in front of God on the path that leads back to the Kingdom of God. So the **ironic thing** is, though we should be closer to the finish line (if the finish line is Heaven) we are not, because we got confused by our sins, and we have wandered so far off the path that leads to Heaven that it is not even funny. Thank God that Jesus doesn't laugh at us, but rather has pity on us. God sent His Son, Jesus, to embrace our humanity—become man to show us what we are supposed to be doing with our **humanity**. For we do not know what we are to do; and even, we are doing the exact opposite of what we are supposed to be doing. We are filling ourselves up; instead, of emptying ourselves. My brothers and sisters in Christ, I tell you what the BTB Bishop from Brownsville, Texas told me: that the key to the Kingdom of God is to give yourself away, to empty yourself! How many times did Bishop Baron tell us that, but we just didn't get it; but when **Bishop Flores** says it in a different way—using different words—suddenly it becomes crystal clear! God knows nothing more than to pour Himself out for us! What does St. Paul say? The same thing, Jesus emptied Himself—gave all of the Divine Love His Dad gave Him, Jesus pours all that Love into us when we receive the Eucharist. It is the key to the Kingdom of God: to give everything that God gives us in the Sacraments of the Catholic Church; or even, if we are not Catholic: if you give all the Love that God gives to you outside of a Sacramental encounter, if you empty yourself of Divine Love—give all of that Love to others—you will be greatly exalted by God the Father! God the Father will say, "this one from Sublette/ West Brooklyn/ Maytown—this one reminds Me of My Son, Jesus. I gave them all of My Love and instead of hoarding it to themselves—they gave it all away. I will give them the keys to My Kingdom—I will let them share My glory forever—they will be rich, because they made themselves **poor**. That my friends, is why when you receive the Eucharist—you make a **Spiritual Communion** for others. God fills you up, and so you do what Jesus did: **you empty** vourself, you pour yourself out! **Yours on the Path** Fr. Randy





THE MASS AND THE SAINTS

"If words will not come; and yet, you cannot remain silent — what else can you do, but let the melody soar?! This is a quote from St. Augustine in describing the Alleluia before the Gospel. Indeed, our hearts are bursting with feelings that words cannot express—that God is coming to speak to us! To what do we owe this honor?! The liturgist, Durandus said, "that the Alleluia does not so much express the joy of that far distant life (Heaven), but the Alleluia points toward it; and although, it is but one word—the

Alleluia has many notes for this joy is greater than can be expressed in a single note. St. Thomas Aquinas said, "that the Alleluia intimates the joy that we feel in the hope of the eternal things to come; and that we repeat the Alleluia, because both the soul and the body are to be clothed in glory. Alleluia is a Hebrew word, and it roughly means: praise our Lord. Just like the Amen, Alleluia has never been translated from Hebrew into Latin – not that its meaning is unknown; rather, as the Doctor of the Church, St. Isidore (560-636) says, "these words have by their very antiquity, a greater and holier authority (and therefore are not translated)." Now on days set aside for penance (like Lent and Advent), the Alleluia is not sung but it is replaced by the Tract. An example of a Lenten Tract is: Praise to You, Lord Jesus Christ, King of endless glory. The Tract is sung with long drawn out notes that sound mournful and severe, and it often has several verses, because according to St. Albert the Great, "a man must be drawn to do penance in many ways before sin is finally destroyed in him." Durandus said, "the Tract symbolizes the tears of the Saints as they actively follow and contemplate our lives." I have often been at odds with myself, as the priest celebrating a Funeral Mass, whether to sing the

Alleluia verse or not. Of course, the whole Church mourns the loss of one of its members, and so how can we rejoice when our loved one has passed? This point was debated after Vatican II and all the many changes to the Liturgy. In the end it was decided that the dead are closer to the triumph of Heaven (returning to Jerusalem), than they are to their captivity to sin (the Babylonian exile); and so the Alleluia should be sung at a Funeral Mass; except of course during those times of the year when the priest wears purple.
