For **Fr. Randy** there is a **new light** on the horizon! This **light** first **dawned** on me at **the Eucharistic Congress** in Indianapolis this past summer. One does not realize how **dark** is **the darkness** that you sit in until **the light** breaks in! **Bishop Flores**



from **Brownsville**, **Texas** says, "Salvation does not consist only in what Jesus does for us; but rather, in how we respond to Jesus." For my primitive mind, I melt that statement down to this: God wants **to pour** all

of His love into me, but do I ask God to pour His love into me? It happens with all the **Sacraments** – that is, God wants to **love** us, but He won't unless we ask Him to **love** us! So, when a baby is first born, God wants to pour all of His love into the baby, but He does not! Rather, God waits until the baby's parents ask the Church to Baptize their child. The same thing with the Sacrament of Reconciliation, God wants to forgive us, but He won't; until, we ask for forgiveness. Isn't that wild?! God wants to forgive me even before I want to be forgiven by God! See, Salvation happens, because of the things that Jesus does for us, but we must ask the Lord – in a sense give Him the permission to save us. I love the Prayer that we pray after we receive Holy Communion. We pray in part: 'Lord, may I never take You for granted.' It is so easy to take the Eucharist for granted, because we receive It so often. But that is why the **Communion lines** form at the very end of Mass – almost the last thing we do in the Mass is receive the Sacrament. The Church makes us say over and over again in all the Prayers of the Mass – "Lord, I do love You. Please, give me Your love." You see, there it is! What Bishop Flores said: Salvation is not so much what Jesus does for us; but rather, do we ask-do we beg Jesus to save us! The Catholic that does not come to Mass every Sunday, literally says, "I don't need You, this week God. I don't need Your Son, Jesus, to die on the altar for me this week. I can get through life on my own." See, that is the wrong attitude to have. Rather, the humble attitude – the human attitude – is to say, "Lord, I'm lost without You. I need You to love me. I need You, Lord Jesus, to pour all of Your love into me or I'm sunk. Please, Lord, fill me with Your love!"

CCD HOLY HOUR





To Begin Again

There is nothing more **frustrating** to a struggling **football** team than to jump off-sides! The offense is struggling to make a first down—it is 3rd down and 8 yards to go for that first down, and an offensive lineman starts the play to early (they call it a **false start**) — suddenly it is 3rd down and 13 yards to go! We **struggle** to grow in **holiness**—the progress we would make in **loving** God more today than we



did yesterday is **difficult**, and to add insult to injury, we often make a **false start**—we **sin** against God. Advent is the beginning of a new Year of Grace – we are given an opportunity to *begin again*—to start again! Our theme as we start this new Year of Grace 2025 with the Sunday Mass on November 30th & December 1st is '7o *Begin Again*.' Let us not be afraid to ask a family member, who has not been going to Mass, to *begin again*, with us, – begin again this incredible journey back into God's presence. Christmas is not only the coming of God to us, but as the Shepherds and the Wise men will teach us—Christmas is about our coming to meet God. Heaven comes to earth, and we—wanting to be lifted up to Heaven—we come with the gift of our life and we bring in tow, the gift of another's life to Church, to celebrate the Mass!



THE MASS AND THE SAINTS

Did you ever notice how **the Gospel** has a lot of **movement**. Ask **George Halas** or **Tom Landry** and they will tell you how **movement** confuses **the Defense**! Whether it is a wide receiver going in **motion** from one side of the field to the other, or

gigantic offensive linemen briefly standing up to disguise the half-back and full-back switching positions in the backfield - movement confuses the Defense! The Gospel is bookended by processions in the Catholic Mass, and this not only confuses the enemy (the Devil), but shows our obedience to God the Father, that we (the hearers of the Gospel) are prepared to follow His Son. The book of the Gospels is taken from the altar – and remember the altar is God's Throne on earth – the altar is the place where the Christ sits – our unseen God and King and Priest! All of us stand up to show that we are ready and equipped to walk the path that the Gospel will command us to take. We should say as we move our **bag of bones that is our body** from the sitting posture to one of standing - we should say, "Jesus Christ was made obedient unto death, even the death on the Cross; so also, should I be prepared to follow the Christ in my vocation - even if it means I should die to myself this day!" (This is the spirituality of the great, St. Francis de Sales) In Churches where the Faith is alive the sanctuary is swarming with servers (young CCD students, who are eager to worship God in the Holy Mass), one server bears **the Processional Cross** aloft to show that the priest, who is about to proclaim **the Gospel**, is marching toward his **death** just as the Lord Jesus **gladly** set His face toward Jerusalem **to die**. Another server with a **smoking thurible of incense** goes before **the Cross** to showcase the odor of good deeds – doing what the Father asks of us. Two candle bearers flank the priest now carrying the Gospel book – the two candles represent the light of knowledge and the light of virtue, which make it possible to see what is contained in the Gospel. St. Jerome would say, the light of **the Gospel candles** is not so much to scatter **the darkness**, but the candlelight is evidence of our joy that Jesus has come to speak to us! For everyone is able to say: *blessed are* our ears for we heard Him speak though our eyes never saw Him, to fulfill what the risen Lord said to Thomas the Apostle at the Resurrection: blessed are they who have not seen; yet still believe! The proclamation of the Gospel is always preceded by the words: Dominus *vobiscum*, the reason being: that the Master, Himself, is Who we are about to hear! St. Francis de Sales said, we make the sign of the Cross on our forehead and mouth and heart, and say, "May the sign of God's love be upon my forehead, because I am not ashamed of Him, be on my lips that I may speak of Him, and be in my heart that I may receive Him soon in Holy **Communion!**" When the Gospel has been read, the priest kisses our Lord; and if, the ambo is equipped (as our **ambo** is in **West Brooklyn**) the Gospel book is displayed before the people. Remember Jesus said, when lightening lights up the sky do not run from here to there or there to here, but remain where you are – well, those who proclaim the Gospel are lightning bolts, who shine by their good examples and thunder with their words, and return to our Lord when they thank Him for the progress they have made. Indeed, the Gospel is Salvation for us, and defense against the Devil. (St. Albert the Great)
