
# Thirty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time November 3, 2024





#### **From the Gusset** "...so wives should be subordinate to their husbands in everything." Eph 5:24

I once heard that we should **pray** that we would **desire** what God wants to give us. <u>Isn't that</u> <u>interesting</u>? We **pray not** asking for something we **want**, but **prayer** is to **want** the very thing that God would most **love** to give us. We **pray** so as to **desire** what God wants to give us. Now **St. Paul** has actually stumbled upon this very notion when he is speaking to the Ephesians. **Paul** says, **wives should be subordinate to their husbands**. You

see, when we are subordinate to someone – we become good listeners. You could almost substitute the word 'listen' in place of the word 'subordinate.' Wives should listen to their husbands in everything. Now, I'm going to tell you something that I tell married persons in the confessional. I tell the married penitent, you are the Spiritual Director of your spouse. So, **listen** to your spouse – find out what they are thinking, and then give them good **Catholic advice** to direct their thoughts, words, and actions in the future. If they are subordinate to you (as they should be in all things **Spiritual**), they will do what you say, and they will grow in **holiness**. Now St. Paul tells the Ephesians, that Jesus loved the Catholic Church, so much that He handed Himself over for her to **sanctify** her. Then it gets a little confusing, **St. Paul** says, **that Jesus** might present to His Father (God) the Church in splendor without spot or wrinkle - that the Church might be holy. Do you see what is happening here? God the Father wanted to give Jesus the Church as a gift. This is not the gift Jesus would have asked for; rather, it is the gift that God the Father wanted to give to His Son. So, the **Catholic Church** has all these **spots** and **blemishes** on her. What does Jesus do? He cleans her up! Jesus **sanctifies** the **Church** by handing Himself over for **crucifixion**, so that Jesus can bathe the **Church** in His **Blood**, and wash away the **Church's spots** and **blemishes**. Then Jesus gives the **Church** back to His Father as perfect and holy and beautiful. Do you see what Jesus just did? He got a gift that He did not really want, but a **gift** the Father wanted to give Him. So, Jesus accepted the **gift**, perfected it, and gave it back to His Dad. When a married person finally dies, they will be judged. God the Father will want them for **Heaven** and Satan will want them for **hell**. A deciding vote must be cast, and God calls on His Son to make that deciding vote. When Jesus comes into the judgment

hall – the Second Person of the Trinity will look like your spouse!! And the spouse who is being judged will breathe a sigh of relief, because they were subordinate to their spouse in this life, they listened to their spouse – who was really Jesus in disguise! And they will become a Saint, because they were subordinate to their spouse in everything!

## ANOINTING MASS

My third cousin (who lived to be almost 104 years old) used to say, *"in the way back,"* if something had happened to her a long time ago. *In the way back*, when administering the Sacrament of Anointing (when it was called *Extreme Unction*) the priest would anoint with Holy Oil the eyes, ears, nostrils, mouth, hands, and feet of the sick person and pray that God would forgive him the sins he had committed

through his senses. Now a days, the priest only anoints with Holy Oil our forehead and the palms of our hands. Our **forehead** is anointed as a sign of **the great intellects** that God has given us – that we might think like God thinks! So no longer do each of our senses need to be anointed; but rather, just our intellects, which are in command of all of our senses. For example, I control what I look at with my intellect as does my intellect control what I would choose to hear, etc. A person ought to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation, before he is anointed - so that in doing an **examination of conscience**: he can recall his **sins** and confess them freely. **The Sacrament of Anointing** then remits all the remaining **sins** of the sick person—that is: any sins he has forgotten or may not have been able to **enumerate properly**; and so, the sick person is freed from all traces of his sins; that is, Anointing frees the sick person from qualms of conscience, the fear of death, and other imperfections still remaining in his soul. Sick people are particularly subject to temptation either through presumption or despair. Presumption tends to blind us to the evil condition that our souls are in, because of our sins. Despair makes us imagine that our sins are too numerous or too grievous for pardon. All this being said, Anointing of the Sick is a direct aid to a holy death, because it gives us sanctifying grace and the fortitude to gladly make a sacrifice of our life to God – just as the Lord did on the Cross! On Saturday, November 9<sup>th</sup>, we will have an Anointing Mass at Our Lady of Perpetual Help in Sublette at 11:00am. Fr. Randy will be in the confessional starting at 10:00am that same morning to hear Confessions. If you know someone, who is sick, and could benefit greatly from receiving **3** Sacraments in one day! – please bring them to our Lady's Church next Saturday.

#### Don't forget to work a Plenary Indulgence for the poor souls in Purgatory! Visiting a


cemetery and praying for the happy repose of our beloved dead during the Octave following All Souls' Day (November 2nd) is 'the fifth work' of a Plenary Indulgence. Of course the other four are: (1) to receive the Eucharist in a state of grace for the deceased, (2) go to Confession and confess our sins, (3) pray the Creed, and (4) say prayers for the Holy Father's intentions (typically an Our Father, a Hail Mary, and a Glory Be).





### THE MASS AND THE SAINTS

You may have noticed that in **the Liturgy of the Mass** (which represents **the Passion**), some things are said in **Greek**, such as *Kyrie, Eleison*, some things are said in **Hebrew**, such as *Alleluia*, *Sabaoth*, and *Amen*; and



some in Latin. This is done, because the inscription on Christ's Cross was written in these three languages. We say, 'Lord, have mercy, ... Christ, have mercy, ... Lord, have mercy,' - each invocation is said to each of the Divine Persons: God the Father, God the Son, and finally God the Holy Spirit. But we also invoke God's mercy three times because of our wretchedness. St. **Thomas Aquinas** tells us that our lives are **dark** because of **sin**, **ignorance**, and **selfishness**. And St. Thomas was taught by St. Albert the Great that we fall into a threefold wretchedness. We fall first into that subjection, which is **slavery to sin**. Secondly, we fall into **poverty**, for sin robs us of **the grace** that God longs to give us. Thirdly, when we **sin**, we are **trampled** upon by the worthless demons on whom we ought rather to have trampled. St. Albert goes on to say that when the Faithful people hear their priest call upon the Lord to have mercy; they too, perceiving this threefold misery of theirs, cry out together with their priest, 'Lord, have mercy, ... Christ, have mercy, ... Lord, have mercy.' And finally, St. Albert teaches us, that power does three things. Power avenges iniquity by just judgment. Power restrains evil by its severity. Power defends virtue and goodness by equitable laws. This is why the Faithful, who feel themselves to be guilty of iniquity, cry out a first time: Lord, have mercy. A second time the Faithful cry out: *Christ, have mercy*, because they know their wills to be rebellious and they desire the Lord to check their rebellion with mercy rather than with wrath and fury. And a third time the Faithful cry out: Lord, have mercy, for they are aware of those things within them that agree with the Law of God, but are not 'totally free' to keep the Law and the Commandments;

and so they say, *Lord, have mercy*, that they would be made free. Speaking from personal experience, I never feel more at one with my **parishioners** than when in the Mass, I say, "Lord have *mercy*," and then you say, the same thing. And then I say, "Christ, have mercy," and you repeat again, the same as I; and finally, your priest says, "Lord, have mercy," and all of you say, "Lord, have mercy." We have all sinned, and so we all beg God for forgiveness - mercy. In the Mass, God responds to our cry of asking for **forgiveness** – not so much by saying, "I forgive you;" but in the Mass, God rather says: I love you!
