## TO BEGIN AGAIN



#### From the Gusset

"The lowly will ever find joy in the Lord, and the poor rejoice in the Holy One of Israel." —Isaiah 29:19

**The Prophet Isaiah** (and all **the Prophets** really) **chastises** the rich, the powerful, **Kings**, and tyrants, because these persons are **not** 

thankful to God. For it was God who gave them their land, their money, their power, their kingdoms,..., but they fail to thank God for these gifts. It is almost as if God has been here before! That the first time God came, He gave to some (we could say a few) - God gave riches to Kings, vineyards to others, and power to yet a third person. This is what made them Kings, Vineyard Owners, and powerful persons – God gave these gifts to them. Why are the poor and the lowly wanting and praying for God to come again? Because they know that when God comes, the Almighty will reward them this time – give them good gifts – just as God gave these gifts to those who are already well-off the first time He came. The poor recognize who the rich got their riches from! That it was God, who gives all riches. So, the lowly call out to God to come again and this time reward them! Those who are rich now, those who are powerful now they don't see what is so readily apparent to the poor and lowly – they don't acknowledge that they are where they are because God put them there. You and I don't realize the power we have been given by God. God gave us the power that we have, and God asks us to share that power with those who are **powerless**. What is **the power** God gave to you that you are to share with others, who have not been given the gift that you have been given? I give you two examples to help you answer this question. Fr. Randy has been given the power to call down the Holy Spirit and change **bread** and **wine** into the **Body** and **Blood** of God's Son. This is a great **power**, and I was given It by God – **the power** to confect **the Eucharist**. So, what do I do with this **power**? What does God expect Fr. Randy to do with his priesthood? God expects me to share It with the people, who are my parishioners, and so I celebrate the Eucharist every day for God's people, because that is what God wants me to do. Another example of God giving a group power: the Eucharistic Congress Pilgrims have been give a power. The U.S. Bishops blessed them, and sent them back home from the Eucharistic Congress with a power – a power to pray and do penance for other people's sins against the Eucharist. Are they using that power? Well, they are trying to. We have asked that **folks** would fill out a **prayer card** (at the back of **Church**) and give our Eucharistic Pilgrims the names of your family members and friends, who are not practicing their Catholic Faith – that the Pilgrims should use the power of their prayers and make reparations for other peoples' sins. God is coming back. The poor, the lowly, the downtrodden have been calling for God to come again. They who do not have, call out to God to share the Almighty's power with them. What if...? What if, when God comes to reward the lowly... what if the poor told God what a good job the Almighty had done with us. That the lowly told God that we had shared our gifts with them! The best way to thank God for His gift to you – is for us to share that gift with others, and then have the poor and the lowly thank God for putting you in their life! Yours on the Path Fr. Randy

### HOLY HOUR WITH THE CCD STUDENTS GUADETE SUNDAY 9:20AM—10:10AM .

Typically we pray a Rosary as the sacramental to begin our Holy Hour, but since our time of Adoration is less than an hour during our CCD class—we will pray the Chaplet of the Infant Jesus of Prague. It is quicker and I believe more meaningful for the CCD students. Remember the Chaplet is composed of three beads (on which we pray the Our Father Prayer) and a loop of twelve beads (on which we pray the Hail Mary Prayer). The three Our Father Prayers are for the holiness of ourselves, our Mom, and our Dad. The twelve Hail Mary Prayers are for our 'spiritual twelve' (our brothers and sisters, Godfather and Godmother, favorite Uncles and Aunts, maybe our friends at school). The kids should have already assigned the name of a loved one to each

of the Holy Apostles and the Saint of the Day, so that the Apostle or the Saint can pray with them, a Hail Mary. In this way two Hail Marys are prayed for the remission of the sins of the people we wish to see most in Heaven. Who makes up your *Spiritual Twelve*? Fill out the worksheet below, come to the Holy Hour on Gaudete Sunday, and pray the Chaplet with the CCD kids. What a wonderful Advent devotion: to introduce your Spiritual Twelve to Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament.

### THE MASS AND THE SAINTS

**St. Isidore (560-636)** tells us that – like the '*Amen*' – the **Alleluia** has never been translated from **Hebrew** into **Latin**. Not that its meaning is unknown; rather, as the learned say, these words have by their antiquity, a greater and **holier authority**. The word

Alleluia means, "praise our Lord," and St. John tells us, in the book of Revelation, that he heard the Heavenly Army of Angels crying out 'Alleluia' - St. John says, "it was a noise like the great roar of the sea and as the voice of Thunder" – when John heard them exclaim: Alleluia! St. Thomas Aquinas (1225-1274) tells us that the Alleluia intimates the joy that we feel and the hope of the eternal things to come – we repeat the Alleluia, because both the soul and the body will one day be clothed in glory. St. Antoninus (1389-1459) says that we repeat the Alleluia, because the first Alleluia denotes the Resurrection of Jesus Christ on Easter Sunday morning, and the second Alleluia stands for the Resurrection of the human race at the second coming of Christ! I remember, one of my classmates in Seminary asked our Liturgist, if we should sing the Alleluia at a Funeral Mass; after all, the family is mourning the loss of a loved one – ought the Church to sing a joyful hymn on such a sad day? "We must sing the Alleluia at a Funeral Mass," was our Liturgist answer – "for we believe this person will rise again and with great glory be borne aloft!" What a great answer to a serious question, and this seems to be exactly what St. Antoninus is telling us. Durandus (1230-1296) says, "the Alleluia does not so much express the joy of that distant life, but points towards it; and although the Alleluia is but one word, it has many, many notes for this joy is greater than could be expressed by a single or just a few notes!" The great St. Augustine (354-430), who was moved

to conversion by singing, says that, "the melody of the Alleluia means that our hearts are bursting with feelings words cannot express. God is the unutterable; and so, if words will not come to you and you cannot remain silent (because your heart is bursting), what else can one do, but let the melody soar?!" Fr. Randy thinks that the Alleluia is one of 'the top five moments in the Mass,' because we are about to be spoken to by Jesus, Himself, in the proclamation of the Gospel! The **Apostles** shouted this word when they saw Jesus work a miracle. Is it not a miracle, that God wants to speak to us, and He most surely does when the **Gospel** is proclaimed! Alleluia!!!
