TO BEGIN AGAIN

From the Gusset To Begin Again

"If a man has a hundred sheep and 1 of them goes astray...."
—Luke 15:4

Our Advent Theme of "beginning again" is captured in the Parable of the Lost Sheep! We cannot be afraid to start over, simply because God is never afraid to start over with us. How many times did God have to start over after the Fall? Hundreds and then thousands and now today millions of times — God has started over! The Almighty has begun again His glorious quest to make us holy. Jesus told the disciples there is one sheep, who has gone astray — I will go search for him, and then bring him



back and *begin again*! Notice that Jesus says that God will rejoice when He has the stray sheep back in the fold; and Jesus, the Good Shepherd, will spend even more time and more energy, and most of all Jesus will **pour out** even more of His **love** on **the sheep** then the Lord **poured** on the 99 that did not stray!!! See, God is **not afraid** to *begin again* with us! I just give you one example from my Chemistry background to help you to see why God is so eager to begin again with us. When I wanted to purify a chemical in the lab, if I had a batch of chemical that was a **little bit brown** in color and the chemical was supposed to be white – that it was some **impurity** that made the whole batch that **light brown color** – I would do a **crystallization**. I would dissolve 'the dirty chemical' in a solvent, and then I would go out and get just one pure white crystal of the chemical, and drop it into the dirty solution. Suddenly, the chemicals in the solution would attach themselves to the pure crystal and then as more and more chemicals attach themselves to the one pure crystal – a great crystallized ball of a clean chemical – pure white would appear, and the light brown contaminant would be locked outside of this pure crystalline ball of chemical (the impurity would stay in solution). See, when God purifies one of our souls with confession – we who are still soiled by our sins – we see how beautiful is the one, who has been forgiven by God, and then we, wanting to have that type of relationship with God, then we go to confession. If you were unable to go to our Communal Penance service on December 12th, in preparation for **Christmas** – here is what you should do. Just come up to **Communion** with your arms crossed over your chest at the Christmas Mass, receive a blessing from God, and then put on your calendar or your day planner that you will go to confession on Saturday



evening in West Brooklyn before the 4:00PM Mass or that you will go to confession on Holy Family Sunday,
December 29th, before the 10:00AM Mass in Sublette. Confess your sins on that day, and then receive the Eucharist throughout the rest of the Christmas season. You should never be afraid to begin again, because God is not afraid to start over with you! Yours on the Path Fr. Randy

Jubilee Pilgrimage

St. John makes It clear that the coming of God was an outward, visible, audible, and tangible event; and so It is, that we should express our joy as we celebrate in this Holy Year – the Year of Grace 2025 – the 2,025th anniversary of the Incarnation – the greatest event of all-time – that God took on our own human flesh. The term "Jubilee" speaks of joy; not just an inner joy, but a jubilation which is manifested outwardly by pilgrimage. Just think, God

journeyed to us 2,025 years ago; and so now, we journey toward God. Fr. Randy will be making a Jubilee Pilgrimage to Venice and Rome during the month of January. I will be praying the Mass for the intentions of the people of Sublette, West Brooklyn, and Maytown. I will be walking through the holy doors of the four Patriarchal Basilicas in Rome. I will be

visiting the tombs of the Saints and Martyrs. I have been granted an audience with the Holy Father.

These are just a few of the things I will be doing on my Jubilee Pilgrimage, and I wish to bring along with me not just your Mass intentions (as great as that is!), but also the petitions that are dearest to your heart. I will have a Mass and prayer intention book placed in the back of our three Churches. Please take a page to record your families' prayer intentions. I will treasure this Prayer Book and take it with me everywhere I go on my Jubilee Pilgrimage and beseech Heaven on your behalf.





THE MASS AND THE SAINTS

King David, just before he anoints his son, Solomon, to be King – David has a beautiful prayer that he prays before all the people and God, Himself. King David has stored up gold, silver, and bronze – iron, wood, and mosaic stones – all the things Solomon will need to build the Temple, and the great King says, "with my whole heart I and my people have

willingly given all these things to You, Lord, God of our ancestors Abraham, Isaac, and Israel." King David acknowledges that all this gold and silver and bronze; indeed, everything was given to them by God (Lord our God, all this wealth that we have brought together to build You a house for Your Holy Name comes from You and is entirely Yours. 1Chronicles 29:16) Yet, we freely give it back to You, Lord! This is the Offertory of the Catholic Mass! St. Thomas Aquinas says, "the celebration of *the Mystery* has begun – *the Mystery* is offered as a sacrifice and consecrated and then received as a Sacrament – the Eucharist. We bring forward bread and wine – the matter of the sacrifice, which is to become Jesus' Body and Blood after the consecration – and then, what we would give to God – the gift of His Son – God gives back to us when we receive Holy Communion." Are we like King David? Do we joyfully offer all that God has given us – do we with joy offer it back to God? The bread and wine are symbols of all the gifts God has given to you and I, and so we come to Mass on Sunday to thank God for giving us these gifts during the last week of our lives and joyfully offer them back to God! All the good things that happened to you during the week, all the bad things that happened to you during the past week - everything we received and didn't receive - we present back to God. Remember, the servants that were given the gold coins? When their Master returned, they had to show the Master what they had done with the gold coins; and so, one showed him ten additional coins, another 5 additional coins, and even the servant, who stored the coin in a handkerchief – he had to offer it back to the Master. A Seminary Professor told us, "the person who won the lottery comes to Mass and thanks God for winning the lottery during the week and makes an offering in the Catholic Mass he attends; and the person, who didn't win the lottery says, "Lord, thank you for not allowing me to win the lottery – even

though I bought 100 tickets and I really needed to win to pay my **debts** – thank you, God, for **not** allowing me to win! I **trust** You will give me something <u>even</u> <u>greater</u> than that **million dollars** in this **Mass**. I trust You will give me Your Son!" As **Bishop Flores** is fond of saying, "**Life looks different after we celebrate the Mass!**" We show our **joy** – just like **King David** and the people did – when we come to **the Offertory** of **the Mass!**
