## 70 Begin Again: Advent Penance Service

### December 12th 6:30pm


The excitement of stepping out of the Confessional—having just confessed one's sins—what hope—what joy—what will happen in my life now that I have begun again to make progress on the path that leads to Heaven? Fr. Randy is always excited about life after he goes to Confession! Is it possible I will sin no more—as I promised (when I made my Act of Contrition) that I would make a valiant effort to use the graces that God poured into me in Reconciliation—not to sin again?!? It is the excitement of beginning again that I experience!

How do I make a good Confession? I make sure I say, "I am sorry" five times during the Sacrament (corresponding to each of the wounds of Christ on the Cross). 1) I plan to confess my sins by examining my conscience and planning to go into the **Confessional**/ I stand in the **Confession line**— by doing this I am already saying, "I am sorry to God," because I state my intentions. 2) Upon entering the Confessional, I say: "Bless me, Father, for I have **sinned**." **3)** I **confess** the **sins** I am heartily sorry for. 4) At the end of my confession, I tell the priest, "I am sorry for these and all the sins of my life – even the ones I have forgotten." 5) I pray the Act of Contrition. Confession is all about saying, "I am sorry" to God for wounding the Body of Christ by my sins.

## TO BEGIN AGAIN



There is always **great excitement** when we **begin** something. To make that **first move** on the **chess board**— advancing the Queen's Bishop pawn two squares forward— what will this <u>new</u> chess game be like? Watching **Pete Rose** dig himself into the batter's box— always the leadoff hitter to start a <u>new</u> **baseball game**— how many hits will **Pete** get today? How about those first few **dates** with a **new girl**, who will turn out to be your **wife**— who could have seen all **the events** that would transpire in your **life** as you **began** that **new relationship**? To **begin** something is to experience **excitement!** As we begin a new liturgical year, **the Year of Grace 2025**—a **Jubilee Year**— we **begin again** to set out on that **path** that leads to **holiness** and there is great **excitement** in our **hearts**. **We know that the Christ is coming. December 25th** was meant, in God's plan of **Salvation**, to be experienced over and over again. The **excitement** of

having God begin a human life living amongst us— what great things will occur— God will die and rise from the dead and bring <u>us</u> new life! We were meant to experience this excitement every year! We know that the Christ is coming. The next Mass we attend, He will enter into our hearts in Holy Communion— body and blood, soul and divinity— what exciting things will happen as we take Jesus with us out into the world, back to our family, back to our homes, into our workplace? We were meant to experience this excitement over and over again! We know that Christ is coming. At the end of our lives, we will stand before Him— not dying of fright a second death, because we did <u>not recognize</u> Him in His first 2 comings; but with great

Him say, "well done, My good and Faithful servant.

Come let Me introduce you to My Father!" We begin again our quest for holiness —a new year filled with 52 weeks of Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation— we begin to come and see the uniting of heaven and earth when Jesus descends upon our altar in the Holy Eucharist. There is always great excitement when we begin again, and I hope you feel that excitement as you exit the confessional on Thursday night, December 12th, when we have our Communal Penance Service. With sin stricken from our hearts, we will begin again to experience the excitement of going out to meet our Christ, who is coming!

## THE MASS AND THE SAINTS/ VISIO DIVINA

The author of Transformed by God's Word, Stephen Binz, is helping us to discover the power of combining *Lectio Divina* with *Visio Divina*! Instead, of the simplistic four-step-prayer technique of *Lectio Divina*— where one reads the Scriptures and then enters into a conversation with God – the contemplative in action (you and I) after reading the Scripture gazes at an Icon (Visio) written about the same Scripture passage, and then enters into the meditation phase. So now, we have a six-step-prayer technique, which involves more of our senses; and thus, inspires a more lively conversation with God! In what we are calling Chapter 4 in the book, we have a meditation on the Annunciation. We read Luke 1:26-38 and Binz tells us to read the text aloud, see the text with our eyes, vocalizing the text with our lips, maybe feeling the Bible by tracing our finger under each word as we read it – but most of all to hear ourselves pronouncing the text with our ears. See, we are trying to involve as many of our senses as possible. Binz even suggests lighting a candle – in this way, we might smell the burning wax or even feel the heat the candle gives off; but we would definitely see the flickering candle. This is all the Lectio step, and then we move into the Visio step – where we gaze upon the Icon and let the Icon draw us into the scene. Remember, Icons are a window into Heaven (eternity). Binz tells us to focus on the faces and gestures of both St. Gabriel and Mary – to notice the colors and symbols and try to relate them to the text of **Scripture** – and to become aware of the uncreated light of the Icon. The light source – the Holy Spirit – is trying to illumine our heart with God's grace, but will we allow this to happen? After these first 2 steps, where we have saturated our sense of hearing (*Lectio*) and saturated our sense of sight (*Visio*); then we are to move into the *Meditatio* step allowing God to speak to us as the Almighty starts to draw out the memories, concerns, and hopes that are in our heart. In this way God makes the Bible and the

**Icon** a very **personal message** just to us! After we allow God to speak to us – we speak to God (*Oratio* step). I love the advice Stephen Binz gives to know when to move from the *Oratio* step into the Contemplation step: when the words of your prayer begin to seem inadequate and no longer necessary, move into the wordless contemplative prayer! Then of the course, the last step is the *Operatio* – where we consider ways to become a **contemplative in action!** Ie. A person, who has surrendered their **being** to God, and allows God's grace to work through them. Chapters 4 through 8 are meditations on the five Joyful Mysteries, and the beauty of this book is that both the Scripture passages are given as well as a corresponding picture of the Icon. Transformed by God's Word is a portable retreat, you can take anywhere. I will be taking it with me on my pilgrimage to Venice and Rome in the Jubilee Year!
