JUBILEE YEAR OF HOPE

From the Gusset

Half of our RCIA classes this year have been on the parts of the Mass (The Mass Explained book by Fr. Crean) and the other half have been on the art of reading and praying with Icons (Transformed by God's Word book by Stephen Binz). This new form of prayer which combines both Lectio Divina and Visio Divina is part of what Pope St. John Paul the great hoped would mark the third millennium of Christianity – bringing together Western Spirituality (Lectio Divina) with Eastern Spirituality (Visio Divina). Stephen Binz chooses a particularly unique Icon of the Wedding Feast of Cana for us to mediate on in Chapter 10 of his book. We can see the wedding couple holding each

his book. We can see the wedding couple holding each other's right hand – **the hands** which are held for the pronouncing of the couple's **wedding vows**. They look into each other's eyes as **Adam** looked into the eyes of **Eve**, when he first woke up from his **slumber** in **the Garden**.

The bride's Dad holds up a cup filled with wine, but the wedding guest to the groom's right has an empty cup and he is motioning for a servant to give him a refill. A refill, which would not have come unless Mary had interceded. In the lower part of the Icon, Mary is the first figure on the left. Note: we read an **Icon**, and just as we read from left to right – we are reading (**praying**) and Mary is the first figure introduced in this Gospel story. St. John says, "the mother of Jesus was (at the wedding in Cana of Galilee)" – St. John says, basically, Jesus and His disciples were accompanying Mary to the celebration! Mary is the first person (in John's Gospel) to show that the appropriate response to the presence of Jesus is 'trusting obedience.' The most fascinating thing is that Jesus holds what is called a 'rabdos' in His hand with which He touches the water jars and turns them into choice wine! Remember Moses had his staff with which he parted the waters of the Red Sea and struck the rock to bring forth water in the desert. The rabdos is not a magic wand; but rather, it is a symbol of the Cross that Jesus will be crucified on. God brings about miracles using instruments – like Moses' staff, the Cross, mud and water, rings in Marriage, and perhaps even the instrument of ourselves, when God uses us to work a miracle in someone else's life!!! Notice that the disciples of Jesus are not pictured in this particular **Icon** that Binz uses in his book. This is because the viewers of this **Icon** are the disciples (us). The last line of John's Gospel account of the Wedding Feast says: Jesus did



this, the first of His signs, ..., and revealed His glory; and His disciples (you and I and the 12) began to believe in Him. Even if you have not been coming to our RCIA classes this year, I hope you will see the power in this new prayer technique of *Visio Divina*. A new dimension of the Scriptures is opening up to those who pray with the Bible in one hand and an Icon in the other!

Jubilee Pilgrimage

Almost from their inception, pilgrimages have always been a way of doing penance. When the journey to Jerusalem became more and more arduous after the city fell to the Arabs in 638, Catholics started making pilgrimages to "the second Jerusalem," Rome. For particularly serious sins, a Confessor would impose the penance of almsgiving or a pilgrimage. Jesus, Himself, talks about how almsgiving covers a multitude of sins, and remember St. Matthew (St. Levi) told our Lord, how if he had deprived others of their money, he would make



recompense four times over for it. Just as a person can make a **donation** in the name of a **deceased relative** or **friend** to a worthy cause, and so make **reparations** for that **person's sins**; so it is, that one can make a **pilgrimage** for others and remit their **sins**! **Fr. Randy** is currently on his **Jubilee Pilgrimage** to **Venice** and **Rome**, and praying **Masses** daily and walking through



THE MASS AND THE SAINTS: VISIO DIVINA



Icons are called *windows into Heaven* – they bring us closer to the Divine Mystery of God's Kingdom by strengthening our **Faith** as we use the **Icon** to pray – to talk to God. We find that when we look toward God (which is what *Visio Divina* is – 'a looking toward God') that God is already looking at us! The doors of an old house (like **the Rectory**) are like this – they have a **keyhole**. Imagine, if you put your eye to the **keyhole** to peek into the next room, and you found another eye ball staring back at you!! That is what an **Icon** is! We look to God, only to find that God is already looking at us! The world's most popular **Icon** is **Our Lady of** Perpetual Help. So many miracles have been granted by God – through the **Icon** – that **the** Redemptorists tell us, that this is the meaning of the great gold background color of the Icon. Gold of course represents the Mystery of Salvation in Christ. The gilded background surrounds the image

of the Mother of God and our Redeemer, but also comes forth through the Icon to shed Its light on us! There are gold highlights on the garments of Mary and Jesus – these are not just accents, but the healing, compassionate light of the Godhead, the same light that infused the Body of Christ at the Resurrection – the light that allowed Jesus to say: I Am the Light of the world! God is light and we can say as St. John did in his first letter: what we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes, what we have looked upon and touched with our hands concerns the Word of Life – for the Life was made visible; we have seen It and testify to It. This scripture comes alive when we look at Our Lady of Perpetual Help's Icon and when we pray and read the Icon we experience this scripture passage – that God gave this Light to us! **Iconographers** tell us that when you **pray** with an **Icon** – the **Icon** should be held at eye level as though you were looking into the eyes of a human lover, but Fr. Randy prefers the prayer **posture** of **kneeling** before an **Icon** to pray. If I am looking up at the **Icon** – I am reminded of how humble I should be – that in reality I am dirt looking up at the God, who made the Universe. When I look up at Our Lady of Perpetual Help, I am reminded of how a Mom looks down at her newborn baby that she cradles in her arms – I am reminded of Michelangelo's famous *Pieta statue* – how Mary held in her arms the Body of Christ taken down from the Cross – I am reminded of God's great love for me that Jesus gave me His Mom from the Cross of Calvary to be my Mother of Perpetual Help! How will I ever repay God for all the gifts He has given to me? I know! I will call on the name of the Lord, I will take up the Chalice of Salvation, I will confect the Eucharist with Our Lady's Icon looking over my shoulder – I will celebrate the Mass in Sublette's Church of Our Lady of Perpetual Help!
