

From the Gusset




In the dogmatic constitution on Sacred Scripture from Vatican II, *Dei Verbum*, the Catholic Church talks in paragraph 21 on this force, this power, this energy that is radiated from God through the Scriptures to us! "For in the Sacred books, the Father who is in Heaven meets His children with great love and speaks with them; and the force and power in the Word of God is so great that it stands as the support and energy of the Church, the strength of

Faith for her sons, the food of the soul, the pure and everlasting source of spiritual life." Fr. Randy finds this effuse language about the power and energy of Sacred Scripture to be every bit as powerful as the language that the Russian Orthodox theologian, Sergius Bulgakov (1871-1944) uses in his book *Icons and the Name of God*. Bulgakov describes the **Icon** as "a mode in which the Divine energy of God radiates into us!" In our RCIA class, we are learning how to pray with **Icons** (*Visio Divina*), while at the same time praying with the **Bible** (*Lectio Divina*). The Catholic Church has always encouraged us to read the Bible and expose ourselves to this force, this power, this energy that is God's love shed upon us; and therefore, the Church has always made it easy for us to have access to the Sacred Scriptures. Back in 2019, we took advantage of how the Pandemic prevented us from having common missals in the pew. The fear that we could contract the virus from sharing a missal that a person exposed to the virus had used – prompted us to buy Lectionaries for each family that they could take home and bring back with them to Mass and follow along with the readings. If your family does not have its own blue Lectionary, please let Fr. Randy know, and he will get you your own personal copy. Otherwise, there should be a copy of the **lectionary** in your pew in **Church**. Now, we only have an Icon of Our Lady of Perpetual on display at all times in our Church in Sublette, but this Icon is radiating the force, the power, the energy of God's love to us – just as the Sacred Scriptures are. During the Summer of the coming year, we will have a special Retreat around the Feast Day of Our Lady of Perpetual Help (June 27th). We will learn the prayer technique of praying with Icons called Visio Divina, and we will practice listening to God speak to us through the force, the power, the energy that God radiates to us from His Icons. Just as we celebrate Word of God Sunday on this 3rd Sunday of Ordinary Time, so we will again visit the power of God's Word as it comes to us through Icons some time around the 13th or 14th Sunday of Ordinary Time. I am excited to help you learn how to pray with Icons, which are simply

another way (a visual way) of the Word of God coming to you! Remember, God wants nothing more than to pour out all of His love into your heart – that you might be supported by the energy of God's love, have your Faith strengthened, and live the Spiritual Life more fervently when you receive the food of the Eucharist into your soul.

Jubilee Pilgrimage

Pope St. John Paul the great made the Jubilee year more routine during his Pontificate. Not only did Pope St. John Paul II oversee the Jubilee of the second Millenium, but he instituted two extraordinary Jubilee Years: 1983 and 1987! The first was entitled: a "Jubilee Year of Redemption," as our redemption began with God becoming man and by His sacrifice on the Cross. It was Pope Pius XI, who ordered a Jubilee Year in 1933 to mark the anniversary of the death of our Lord. Pope John Paul made use of this



precedent by calculating 50 years from 1933 and 1,950 years from the time of Christ's death to order up this **Jubilee of Redemption**. The **Swiss Guard** as well as **the Vatican employees** had a



saying about Pope John Paul: "Per noi con Giovanni Paolo II e sempre Anno Santo," which means: "For us, with John Paul II, it is always a Holy Year!" This proved to be, so true for just after bricking up the Holy Door in 1984—the cement and mortar not completely dry—the San Petrini found themselves un-bricking the Holy Door in 1987 as the Pope declared a "Marian Year of Jubilee." The Holy Father wrote an encyclical on the Blessed Virgin Mary in the Life of the Church, called

Redemptoris Mater (Mother of the Redeemer), which was issued on March 25, 1987. This Marian Pope was anticipating the Jubilee 2000—saying, "just as Mary had come before Christ on the horizon in the story of salvation, and her assent was the premise for God's incarnation, our meditation upon Mary during this Jubilee Year of 1987 ought to precede the Jubilee Year of Christ's nativity!" Because as every good Astronomer knows, the morning star always appears before the sun, but in this case, the sun is Christ, He is the "sun of

righteousness." (Malachi 3:20) Pope Francis may be able to tie Pope John Paul's record of Jubilee Years. Pope Francis called an extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy in 2015-2016, then there is the current Jubilee Year of Hope, and if Pope Francis is still around in 2033—he would preside over the Jubilee marking the greatest event in Salvation history—the death and Resurrection of our Lord.



THE MASS AND THE SAINTS: VISIO DIVINA

In his book: Transformed by God's Word – Stephen Binz is teaching us how to pray with Icons (Visio Divina). Part of the beauty of this book is that Binz includes a color photo of each Icon and the Scripture passage that the Icon is written from. Binz simply uses twenty Icons of the Mysteries of the Rosary, so all five decades of the Joyful, Sorrowful, Luminous, and Glorious Mysteries. Interestingly enough, he uses an Icon of the storm at sea to illustrate Visio Divina with the Luminous Mystery of the Proclamation of the Kingdom. Having read Mark 1:14-18 and 4:35-41, we hear Jesus proclaiming "that this is the time of fulfillment. The Kingdom of God is at hand!" Remember Fr. Randy's latest 'theological thrill' – is that there is a whole Theology based on 'the hand.' Now, in referring to the closeness of the Kingdom as being 'near by' or as close to a person as his own hand is to his body, we can understand how close by our side that God really wants to be! Remember, how Jesus tells His disciples: "I will be with you always - until the end of time!" (Mt 28:20) Yet, when fear strikes – when chaos erupts in our life – when we lose a loved one to death – or simply when someone sins against us – we can feel that God is nowhere to be found – that God has abandoned us! When the Lord quiets the storm at sea, He asks the question: Why were you terrified? Do you not have yet have Faith?!? The twelve think that their fear is legitimate after all, the storms on the Sea of Galilee are notorious for being sudden and ferocious; yet, this shocks Jesus! We ourselves are easily fear-filled when something does not go quite right in our life, and this **shocks** Jesus aswell! The Lord has told us that His Father's **Kingdom** is at **hand** – Jesus has told us countless times that He is present—standing at our side, waiting behind the locked doors of the Tabernacle, Jesus is really, truly, and substantial present to us in the

Eucharist of the Mass – do we still not realize this? Take a look at the **Icon** of our Lord in **the boat** with the twelve. Some of the disciples reach out to touch our Lord, Himself. Other disciples touch the mast of the ship, which is in the shape of a Cross. Some of the disciples touch their hearts, and a few of the disciples grip their fishing net tighter. These are all **Iconic symbols** of the closeness of Jesus Christ to us. For cannot all of us **physically touch** God when we eat the Eucharist, or enter the Church, God's house on earth (the symbol of the ship at sea with the Cross as its mast) – we can all receive the grace of God (God's love) when we receive a **Sacrament** (God touching our heart), and we can all feel the closeness of God when we simply live out the vocation that God gave to us (clutch the fishing net of discipleship). Yes, we need Faith to see how close at hand Jesus Christ really is to us, but if we have Faith only the size of a mustard seed, we know that the Kingdom of God is at **hand** (so close to us); because the Father sent His Son from His righthand side to dwell with you!
