JUBILEE YEAR OF HOPE

From the Gusset

Beloved, if our hearts do not condemn us, we have confidence in God and receive from Him whatever we ask, because we keep His Commandments and do what pleases Him. And His commandment is this: we should believe in the name of His Son, Jesus Christ, and love one another just as He commanded us. Those who keep His Commandments remain in Him, and He in them, and the way we know that He remains in us is from the spirit He gave us. (1John 3: 21-24)



I think the best thing that came out of the pandemic was our practice of making a Spiritual Communion for others. The Church, for thousands of years, encouraged us to make a Spiritual Communion for ourselves; whenever, we were unable to receive the Eucharist—that we would ask God to give us the graces of the Sacrament, so we could live our vocations for another week even though we were unable to physically receive the Eucharist. The US Bishops encouraged priests to pray the Mass and to make a Spiritual Communion for all of their parishioners. Even as we were coming out of the pandemic and the aged and those more susceptible to catching the virus were still unable to come to Mass—priests were encouraged to make a Spiritual Communion for many. In our three parishes, we adopted the practice of praying the Spiritual Communion Prayer for others just before we received Holy Communion ourselves. In a sense we were putting ourselves last and others first – the very **practice** that Christ encouraged us to do – to be a servant to others. You see, our Lord came to give His life as a ransom for many – to lay down His life that others might Live. When God the Father sees us imitating His Son, which is what we do when we ask God to give others the graces of the Blessed Sacrament – God is well pleased with us! God sends the Holy Spirit, who remains with us, and the Holy Spirit then prompts us to continue to believe in the name of Jesus Christ and to love others as the Christ loved others. I hope that the list of persons that you are making a Spiritual Communion for is growing each week. As your priest, I will continue to prompt you to make a Spiritual Communion for your Spiritual Twelve (those 12 special people in your life that you want to introduce our Lord to on the Resurrection day), for your beloved dead, for your spiritually adopted baby, who is in danger of abortion, and for our 10 Eucharistic Congress pilgrims. On top of these people, I encourage you to add others: the sick of your family and friends, your co-workers and your boss, elected government officials both Catholic and non-Catholic, and even to make a Spiritual Communion for the people, who sin against you! As St. John tells us, if we keep God's Commandments and please God the Father by loving the name of His Son, Jesus,... if we love others enough to make a Spiritual Communion for them – than we can have the confidence that God will give the graces to others that we ask Him to; in which case, the whole world benefits from our going to Mass and receiving the Blessed Sacrament in a state of grace and making a **Spiritual Communion** for others!

Jubilee Pilgrimage

The Jubilee Year of 1950 was truly a year of jubilation as the Catholic Church had resisted the ravages of Fascism, Nazism, and the second World War, and She could reassure Her Faithful: "that the gates of hell had not been able to prevail upon Her." After the horrific years of hate and murder, the destruction of entire cities and the annihilation of entire populations of people—the Catholic Church called for a year of Reconciliation—where former enemies would forgive each other and walk hand in hand through the Holy Door. A new Holy Door was built and installed for the Jubilee. The old doors were constructed of marble and dated from the Pontificate of Benedict XIV (1749) – the new Doors were



constructed out of bronze and had 16 panels illustrating the Theme of the Holy Year: the



great return and the great pardon. Beginning with the expulsion of Adam and Eve from the garden, there are 15 scenes from the Old and the New Testament including St. Peter's great question, "Lord, how often must I forgive my brother?" The panels conclude with the opening of the Holy Door by Pius XII, himself. Just below the last scene are written the words from the Book of Revelation: "look, I am standing at the Door and knocking." Though the seven Holy Doors throughout the **Rockford Diocese will not be nearly** as ornate, all the same blessings and graces can be obtained by walking through them! Yet as I walk through the grand Holy Door of St. Peter's in Rome, I encourage you to write the names of the people you love in my "Prayer and Blessing Book," which I will hold in my hands as I walk through the Holy Doors in Italy, and place on the altar during my Masses on the pilgrimage in January. Just think, your loved ones will go with Fr. Randy on his pilgrimage in the Jubilee Year 2025!

THE MASS AND THE SAINTS

St. Albert the Great asks us the question: do we take pleasure in devoting ourselves to God in prayer and the sacrifice of His Son? In other words, do you delight in talking to God directly (in prayer) and do you also find great happiness in talking to God the Father through His Son, Jesus (in the Mass)? In the ranking of the senses – the sense of smell is often in the last place; which is **ironic**, because it just might be that **the presence of God** is detected best by **smell!** Just think about it for a moment. Because our sense of smell is so weak in comparison to the other senses – we need something to be close by to smell it. This is not true for sight and sound – from a high vantage point, we can see something miles away and we can hear Church bells ringing from a great distance, but the other three senses need near proximity to function. Remember when Isaac pulled his son, Jacob, close to him that he might feel and smell his son, and **Isaac** also took from the hand of **Jacob** the bowl of **game meat**, which he ate. **Isaac** says, "Ah, the fragrance of my son is like the fragrance of a field that the Lord has blessed!" The prayers of the Son (are the Mass, the conversation of the Son to the Father) are sweet smelling to God the Father, and this is the reason the Church uses incense in the Mass. Notice that the **priest** always **incenses** completely, first the altar (which represents Christ), and then images of the Saints (Icons, Statues,...), and then finally the people are incensed. St. Thomas Aquinas says, "that since grace passes to the Faithful through the work of Christ's ministers that all must be **incensed** in order of their rank." So, first the Christ, then His **Saints**, and then finally those, who are to one day become God's Saints (us). I will never forget, Fr. Striedl asking me to pray a Funeral Mass for one of his parishioners. Fr. Striedl was going to attend the Men's Conference in DeKalb, which he and his team have put together every year for all the Catholic men in the Midwest. So, after the Funeral Mass, I went to the Conference to help with Confessions, and Fr. Striedl said to me, "you smell like you have come from Mass!" Father smelled the **incense** that had **permeated** my clothes. Are people able to tell when you have been to Mass? Do people ever smell incense on you, and realize how close you have been to the God, who created the Universe – that God is inside of you, because you received Him in Holy **Communion!** Incense was used in the Temple worship of God in the Old Testament, but the Church still preserves the custom of using incense, because incense signifies something that must always exist and must always be renewed: that we take pleasure in the closeness of God to us in the Holy Mass!
