

JUBILEE YEAR OF HOPE

From the Gusset

Last week in this column, we explored how the Paschal Mystery (the Passion, death, Resurrection, and Ascension in glory of Jesus Christ) occurs at every Mass and this Mystery is not just repeated, but happens as if for the very first time, each time, we celebrate the Mass. Ultimately this happens, so as to allow you and I to participate as members of the Body of Christ in the Paschal Mystery. St. Albert the Great (who taught St. Thomas Aquinas everything he knew – and then St. Thomas, in taking his instruction from St. Albert – St. Thomas took our understanding of the Mystery of God's plan of Salvation to an epic height, which we are still coming to a greater and greater understanding of what God is doing to bring us

back into paradise) said that the greatest of the Secret Prayers (see The Mass and Saints column in this bulletin for more information on the Secret Prayers) is the Prayer the priest whispers at the Offering of the Gifts. The priest bows to: the gifts of bread and wine and the altar, and prays that the people, who have come to the Mass, may be incorporated into the Body of Christ; so that, you and I both (and all who have come to the Mass) may be an acceptable sacrifice to God the Father. So acceptable, that when God the Father welcomes His Son back into Heaven – that God also welcomes each one of us as we come back home to the Father's House (Heaven). This Secret Prayer comes from the Prayer over the Offerings of the first Mass of the Liturgical Year, the 1st Sunday of Advent. The priest prays: may these sacred things, O Lord, cleanse us by their mighty power, and make us come in purity to their origin. This 9th century Prayer is



Your gifts to us, and may what You grant us to celebrate devoutly here below gain for us the prize of eternal redemption. You see, the priest is asking for the holiest of things to happen: that each one of us would become so intimate with Jesus —so close to our Lord—that God the Father (poor eyesight and all) would not be able to distinguish the sacrifice of Jesus, His Son, from our sacrifice—the sacrifice of God the Father's adopted sons and daughters. In a certain sense, it is not bread and wine that are placed on the altar, but your life, and my life, and the life of all the Mass goers is placed on the altar WITH the life of Jesus! We are to unite all our prayers, works, joys, and sufferings with all the Prayers of Jesus, with all the Works of Jesus, with all the Joys of Jesus, and with all the Sufferings of Jesus. We are so intimate with Jesus — so close to God's Son—that what happened to Jesus (His offering of His life as a sacrifice to the Father for the forgiveness of our sins and for Jesus giving us new Life), happens to us; and the Father who is always well pleased with His Son, may also be well pleased with us! If we think the Mass is boring—it is because we don't understand that we are attempting to give ourselves away as a gift to God the Father, who gave us all that we have and all that we are, in the first place.



The Art of the Last Supper

On wet, rainy day in Venice, I spent the morning, after praying the Mass, at the **Scuola San Rocco**. This is a two-story museum, which contains 50+ paintings by Jacopo Tintoretto. The San Rocco is Tintoretto's personal vision of Catholic History—the Scuola has been called: Tintoretto's Sistine Chapel! Painted in 1579, a beggar, a dog, and a serving woman dominate the foreground of the **Last Supper** as **Tintoretto** emphasizes the every day gathering of a meal that gives us life. The table poses a dramatic angle, where the disciples get proportionally smaller and mysteriously lower as they get closer to Jesus, who is at the far end of the table. The disciple at the foot of the table is twice as big as our

Lord! Jacopo uses a tiled floor to create a 3D-effect and the distant tiles are exaggeratedly smaller, which makes for an incredibly long table surrounded by (what seems to be) more than twelve disciples. Isn't this the Last Supper of this Sunday's Mass. Jesus has so many more disciples to gather around Him and feed the Bread of Life to! And just think, you are one of them! When God the Father asks you, at your particular Judgment: "Did My Son feed you His Flesh and His Blood?" Imagine, if Jesus spoke up and said, "I remember feeding this one, Dad. I poured all of My love into their heart. This one was one of My servant priest's. This one

was one of Fr. Randy's parishioners!"

THE MASS AND THE SAINTS

What is **the priest** doing up there? What **prayer** is he whispering – I cannot hear him? Why is **the priest** hiding behind the altar and genuflecting more than his parishioners? My Seminary Formators warned me not to allow the Mass to become just another activity or task to be done. You see, with all jobs (not just the job of the **Priesthood of Jesus Christ).** our excitement tends to diminishes asymptotically from the high point of our first



day on the job to our going into the work place after 40 years of being on the job. The danger for the priest is that the Mass becomes a work to be worked; rather than, a prayer to be prayed! The "Secret prayers" of the Mass are meant to be an antidote. The Secret prayers are said quietly by the priest at eight different points during the Mass (as far as I can count). St. Thomas Aguinas says, "some things in the Mass, the priest says publicly, namely the common prayers that pertain both to himself and to the people. Other things pertain only to the priest such as, the offering, and so these are said in secret. Yet in each, the priest stirs up the attention of the people." St. Thomas' teacher, St. Albert the Great, gave the example that in the Book of Numbers, Aaron and his priest sons alone would enter the temple **Tabernacle** and sort and carry the things when the camp was to advance. The people were not allowed to see the things of the sanctuary; and so, Aaron and his sons wrapped them up – for if the people looked out of curiosity, they would be struck dead. You see, if holy things are made a public spectacle, they become familiar and are reckoned of little value or worth; but if holy things are concealed – they are reverenced all the more! Fr. Randy bows to the altar and whispers Secret prayers to Jesus to remind himself that whether it is the first time or now over the 10,000th time I have offered the Mass – that something extraordinary – something fantastically Mystical and Holy is happening in the celebration of the Mass: God is coming to visit His people and feed them the Flesh and Blood of His Son! Fr. Randy, also, hides behind the altar and whispers Secret prayers to Jesus to pique your attention, so that your prayer life - once on fire with an awareness of the presence of God - would never get stale and routine with time. Come to our next **RCIA** meeting and learn the Theology behind the eight **Secret** prayers of the Mass!
