
From the Gusset—Our Desert Path

You Will Be My Witnesses

Have you noticed recently, in reading the obituary announcing the death of a Catholic – that the once ubiquitous line: "donations may be made to Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church," – have all but disappeared from obituaries? This is why the Rockford Diocese is undertaking a capitol campaign to raise 60 million dollars. Statistics are showing that the generation of Catholics, who are now passing away will be the last generation, who will

include the Church in their estate. Bishop Malloy is worried that, if we don't have a capitol campaign, that with tithing decreasing—that future Diocesan evangelization programs will be

unfunded. Each parish in the Rockford Diocese has been assigned a campaign target based on the number of Parish families and our regular Sunday giving. Each Parishes' goal is listed below. I will be asking the members of the Finance Council at each Church to recommend 1 or 2 campaign chairpersons, who will form with me a campaign volunteer team. The team will attend a Regional Parish Wave Orientation meeting at St. Mary's Church in Sterling, where we will learn how to determine gift request amounts for all our registered families. There are no plans to close parishes or schools in the Diocese at this time, and the success of You Will Be My Witnesses Campaign will insure that the Diocese has the finances to fund growth at our parishes both spiritually in our souls and structurally in our Church and hall buildings.



The Art of the Last Supper

The Theology of "the hand of God" is throughout all of Sacred Scripture and the Tradition of the Catholic Church. Next time you are at Mass just watch the priest's hands and you will be amazed at how God works. Specifically, during the Eucharistic Prayer watch which way the palms of the priest's hands are turned. For most of the Eucharistic Prayer (and the Prayers of the Mass), the priest holds his hands in the "orans" posture, – that is stretched out with palms pointing up toward Heaven – but for a few short moments the priest's hands are held out with palms pointing down toward Earth. Now look at the Last



Supper painting of Leonardo da Vinci. The Christ has His righthand (*palm* pointed down) as He reaches for **the bread**, which He will **dip into the dish**, and His lefthand (*palm* pointed up) as He prays to His Father in **Heaven**. This is exactly **the Theology** of "the hand of God" that I am talking about all the time. The priest (in the Mass – and for ALL OF THE MASS) is Jesus Christ. Just as the Lord spoke to His Father in **Heaven** and to His disciples on Earth at the Last Supper, so does Jesus speak through **Fr. Randy** to both God and you (the Lord's disciples) in the Mass. That is why you want to go to Mass every Sunday – to hear Jesus speak to His Father about you, and to hear Jesus speak to you about His Father!



"To Follow the Christ to Calvary"

Our theme for this Lent is to walk with Jesus to Calvary. For 40 days we will be led by our Lord to a small hill just outside of the city of Jerusalem called Calvary, and once there we will watch our Lord die for us. These days of Lent will be scary ones – it should be upsetting (to say the least) – it should make us uneasy that God loves us, so much He is willing to die for us; and so, we will go on a journey with Jesus. We will pray. We will fast. We will give alms. We will do all of these

things, so that the Lord might call us "His servants," because anyone who serves Jesus – His Heavenly Father will honor! (John 12:26) During the full weeks of Lent this year – all the daily Masses (Tuesday-Friday) will be held at just one of our 3 Churches, and we will cycle through our 3 Churches twice. Also the first Sunday of Lent will have a different Mass Schedule. There will be no 10:30am Mass on March 9th in Sublette; rather, a 5:00pm Mass will be celebrated at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church.

THE MASS AND THE SAINTS

Compared to the other **Sacraments** – **the Eucharist** requires both a greater and a more widespread or **popular devotion**. We must pray **the Mass** with **greater passion** (some would say **zeal**), because the whole Church benefits from **the celebration** of **the Eucharist**.



The other **Sacraments** benefit only the one, who receives **the Sacrament** – so only the one whose head and hands are anointed receives the healing graces of the Anointing of the Sick. Only the one who examines his **conscience**, confesses his **sins**, and is **truly sorry** for them can be absolved in the Confessional. Since, those present at the Mass and even those who are absent can receive the blessings and graces that flow from the Mass (because we ask God to give others the benefits of our celebration of the Mass), we must pray with great passion that God would be so generous as to benefit even the whole world! This having been said, we do pray intensely for a few particular individuals in the Mass; such as, the Holy Father and our **Bishop**, and although we do not give his name – we pray for our **priest** (the giver of the **Sacrament** at that **Mass**) in particular and generically for all **priests** and all deacons. We do this because all of these are **frail men** – prone to **sin** like all of **mankind**; thus, they require our prayers more intensely than other men, because the Catholic Church relies so heavily upon them. The Devil plots against the clergy more than against married or single persons; and so, we would **pray more intensely** for our **priest**, because without him – we could not receive the **Eucharist.** Since without the Pope we would not have a **Bishop** and without our **Bishop** we would not have our **priest** – we **pray intensely** for them as well. Jesus, Himself, **encourages** us to have a devotion to the Pope and our Bishop – for didn't Jesus say to St. Peter: Satan has demanded to sift all of you like wheat, but I have prayed that your own Faith may not fail; and once you have turned back, you must strengthen your brothers. The more a priest goes to confession himself, the better the confessor he becomes, because Jesus prayed for St. Peter, that **Peter**, having turned from his sins, would have great success in helping others who sinned to come back to the practice of their Faith. Always remember that the Eucharistic Prayer is really an **intimate conversation** between Jesus and His Father – very much like the conversation Jesus had with His Dad in the garden of Gethsemane and the conversation Jesus had with the



Almighty while He was dying on the Cross. Though we don't have a speaking part in the Eucharistic Prayer – we pray along with Jesus just as Jesus wanted the disciples to pray with Him in the Garden and on Calvary. Pray passionately for your priest, your Bishop, and your Pope – even if you don't particularly like them – because they are the hands and feet of our Lord bringing you the graces that will make you a Saint. Both Isaiah and St. Paul said: how beautiful are the feet of those who bring the Good News! (Romans 10:15, Isaiah 52:7)
