

#### From the Gusset—Our Desert Path

The Catholic Church is so gentle with human souls. Though the Church would give us the graces of the Vocational Sacraments, if we would only ask for them; yet, She won't force them upon us. This notion – that the Church calls us to accept our vocation from God, but will not force us to do something we don't want to do – is expertly captured in the famous Caravaggio painting of the Calling of St. Matthew. The Lord has just entered the Customs Post, where Levi (later to




become the great Saint and writer of the Gospel) is busy counting the tax money from Capernaum – our Lord stretches out His right hand to point at Matthew and call him to follow the Lord. (Matthew 9:9) Caravaggio paints the beckoning hand as very passive – limply gesturing toward the seated Tax Collector. In a stroke of brilliance, Caravaggio has used the hand of Adam in Michelangelo's famous fresco painting on the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel – it is the hand of Adam that God will touch and bring the man to life! St. Jerome said, that we are not truly 'alive' until we live the vocation God has ordained us to live. Our Lord said, I came that they might have life and have it more abundantly. (John 10:10) Jesus is offering Levi the Sacrament of Holy Orders. Will Levi accept this vocational call or not? The Lord is not going to try to reason with the Tax Collector and tell Levi all the pros and cons of accepting this calling – the Lord simply calls and departs the Customs Post, leaving the decision up to Levi. Yet, hidden in the dark shadow of Caravaggio's Masterpiece is the left hand of our Lord, the hand closest to the Sacred Heart. I call this 'the grasping hand' or 'the desirous hand' of our Lord. Though the decision belongs to Levi, Jesus greatly desires – Jesus wishes that Matthew will follow Him – for when did the Persons of the Trinity decide who would make up the twelve Apostles? Was it at the beginning of time – 13.8 billion years ago – or was it the night

before when Jesus went up the mountain and spent the night in prayer and then came down called the twelve to Himself. *The Messianic secret* is not so much that God the Father wants to tell you the secret that Jesus is His Son, but the great secret that God wishes to tell each one of us is that we are His sons and daughters! God wants to give us all of His love in the Sacraments that Jesus

died on Calvary to give to us. Jesus takes us into the desert this Season of Lent to teach us what it means to be called: God's beloved one! Our Lord (just like in every other Season) wants to help us recognize that the purpose of our life is to become a worthy receptacle into which Jesus can pour all of His Divine Love into, when we receive Holy Communion. Jesus calls us (the right hand of Jesus in the Caravaggio painting) to go to Mass every Sunday, so He can feed us the Eucharist; but the Lord won't force us to go to Mass. Yet and still, Jesus greatly desires to eat this Supper with us (the left hand – the hand closest to His Sacred Heart in the painting: the Calling of St. Matthew)!

## The Chaplet of Our Lady of Sorrows

A beautiful Lenten devotion is to pray the Chaplet of Our Lady of Sorrows. Our poor Lady's heart was pierced seven times, because we failed to see the beauty of her Son when we sinned. It is not hard to memorize the Seven Sorrows—least ways, the last four Sorrows. The 4th

Sorrow is the fourth Station of the Cross, and the last three Sorrows are the last three Stations of the Cross! A wonderful dynamic occurs when we try to console our Lady by praying this Sacramental. We start praying the 49 Hail Mary Prayers of the Chaplet, telling Mary that we wish to offer her some relief and consolation; and by the time we arrive at the end of the Chaplet—God has switched the tables on us—Mary is offering us, her consolation, because we have been harmed by our sins more than Mary or her Son have been harmed! We will pray the Chaplet before our Wednesday Mass in Sublette on the Feast of St. Joseph (March 19th). Why not experience this Mystery of a Mother's love for yourself—come early to Wednesday Morning's Mass to accompany our Mother in her grief and sorrow—and watch how Mary winds up comforting you!



#### THE MASS AND THE SAINTS

Which oblation, we beseech Thee, O God, deign to make holy + blessed, + enrolled, +

established, reasonable and acceptable, that It may become for us the + Body and + Blood of Thy most beloved Son, our Lord Jesus Christ.

Be pleased, O God, we pray, to bless, acknowledge, and approve this offering in every respect; make it spiritual and acceptable, so that It may become for us the Body and Blood of Your most beloved Son, our Lord Jesus Christ.

The question might be rightly asked: which **Saint** passed on to us in writing, the words of invocation, when the bread of the Eucharist and the cup of blessing are consecrated? The answer would be St. Paul and the Saintly writers of the Gospels, but the Catholic Church has always held that both before and after the holy words of **consecration** are spoken that other words of great importance to *the Mystery* are also said, and these were given to us by an unwritten teaching, which Mother Church calls Tradition! St. Thomas Aquinas says that it is not inappropriate to ask God for something that we know with certainty He will do, because Jesus taught the Twelve to ask His Father for things even, if God was already going to give them. For remember in teaching the Twelve how to pray the Our Father Prayer, Jesus said, Your Father knows what you need even before you ask Him. (Matthew 6:8) The ultimate example of this is that on our Lord's **last night** on **earth**, He asked His Heavenly Father, if His Dad might glorify His Son. Of course, God the Father already planned to glorify Jesus; and yet and still, Jesus asked to be glorified. The priest then asks God to accept the bread and wine of the Mass and make them the **Body** and **Blood** of His Son – God already planned to do it, but God is pleased that the priest makes this request for himself and all the people! Oughten, we to ask our **spouse** for their **love**? Even though our beloved wants to give us his **love** – it is perfectly appropriate to ask him to show his **love** to us! **St. Thomas** goes on to say that the priest is really asking that the oblation of bread and wine would be fruitful for us. In other words, the priest knows God will make the **bread** and **wine** – the **Body** and **Blood** of our Lord; and so, the priests asks that when we are given this *tremendously great gift* that we would produce a very

abundant harvest — for didn't our Lord say, when the seed falls to the ground and dies — it will spring up and yield a harvest of 30, 60, or 100-fold! The old rite had the priest making 5 Crosses during this "quam oblationem" Prayer — to symbolize (according to Durandus) the old Law — the five books, or to symbolize (according to St. Thomas) the five persons involved in the sale of our Lord; that is: the priests, the scribes, the Pharisees, Judas, and our Lord, Himself.
