

### From the Gusset—Our Desert Path

### You are God's beloved One

What does it mean to be called "God's beloved one?"
Remember, when Jesus was baptized in the Jordan by John the Baptist – He rose from the water – the Holy Spirit, like a dove, descended upon Him, and then God's voice is heard: this is My beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased. (Do you notice the language of marriage? The Father calls the Son: My beloved!) Jesus immediately goes into the desert following His Baptism. The purpose of Lent is to teach us what it means to be called: God's beloved one, and how to become 'well pleasing' to God. All of us have been baptized. God the Father called us: His beloved one at our baptisms, and now the Holy Spirit has driven us out into the desert, so that we can encounter



Jesus, the Beloved Son, and Jesus will teach us, and Jesus will feed us, and Jesus will challenge us to confront the Truth. What is the Truth? The Truth is that we all came from God and we will all return to God! This was the purpose of the Catholic Church putting ashes on our foreheads on Ash Wednesday: to tap on our intellect (our foreheads are a symbol of our intellect), and remind us (because we forget so quickly – we think we are so great!) – to remind us that we are made out of the dirt— "remember you are dirt and to dirt you shall return!"

God had to get down on the ground and form each one of us – not just Adam was formed out of the dust, but you and I both and everyone else – God formed us out of the dust, and one day (after we die) we will all decay back into the dirt from which we came. But (and this is the biggest 'but' in Salvation History) – but, because we were baptized, because we are God's beloved one, because God wants to give us all of His love – we will rise to eternal life in glorified bodies, because of what the Second Person of the Trinity did for us. Lent, the desert, is full of 'uncertainty:' hunger, cold, doubts about how much God loves us, will the Almighty

feed us, how long until we experience glory, — add your own uncertainty to the list.... Lent is full of uncertainties! We must remember above all that God said, when we came up out of the waters of our own Baptism, God said, "this is My beloved one," and so we go into the desert of Lent, because Jesus will show us how to be become well pleasing to His Dad. Jesus is in the desert and that is the only reason we go out into these 40 days: to be taught by the Lord, to let the Lord feed us, His Flesh and His Blood, and to come to know the Truth that God loves

us so much; that in, **40 days**, God will send His Son to die for you, and **visit the dead**, and rise to **glory** – all to show you that **Lent**, that **the desert**, is not the destination; but only **the path** that leads to your **glory!** Yours on the Path Fr. Randy






Remember the BTB Bishop from Brownsville, Texas said, "God knows only one verb – to pour Himself out." No matter how you slice it, Lent is all about going to Confession. The Lord waits for us out in the desert. Yes, Jesus is going to teach us (what it means to live a life pleasing to His Father), feed us (that food we hunger for: the Eucharist), and challenge us (to give ourselves completely over to God); but it is essential that when we meet the Lord in the desert for these 40-days that we confess our sins and express our true sorrow for having offended Him. We have three great opportunities coming up to go to Confession:

#1 our Communal Penance Service on April 3<sup>rd</sup> at Our Lady of Perpetual Help in Sublette, #2 our Pilgrimage for a Plenary Indulgence on April 5th to St. Mary's in Sterling, #3 and the Be Reconciled Day on April 9th at all of our Churches.

As your **desert shepherd**, I am pushing the **Act of Contrition** by the great **St. Francis de Sales**, which you can find a copy of in this **bulletin**. Why? Because this **Act of** 

Contrition highlights God's favorite verb: to pour Himself out! All the Sacraments are this generous pouring out of God's love into the humbled receptacles called our souls. Just like farmers pray for God to send the rain that their crops may grow – please, beginning to pray that God would pour all of His love into your heart in your Lenten Confession, that your soul might begin to grow in magnanimity. May our humble submission to God's generosity bring many souls into glory, when we work a Plenary Indulgence for them during this Jubilee year!





Bishop Malloy has a vision for our Diocese that involves evangelization as its core element. The Rockford Diocese is undertaking a Capitol Campaign to raise monies to fund this vision and strengthen the Faith of the next generation of Catholics citizens in Northwestern Illinois. Churches to help Fr. Randy meet or exceed our parish assessments. St. Mary of the



# THE MASS AND THE SAINTS

The holy oils that the priest carries in his anointing case to the Hospital and Nursing home and for Home visits have already been blessed by the Bishop at the Chrism Mass on Holy Thursday; yet, Fr. Randy likes to help the sick persons to see the power of Christ's Cross. St. Augustine says that the Cross is the greatest 'sign' of Christ! Listen to this great quote from the Doctor of Grace: for unless that sign (the Cross) be applied, whether it be to the foreheads of believers (Confirmation), or to the very water out of which they are regenerated (Baptism), or to the oil with which they received the anointing chrism (Holy Orders), or to the Sacrifice that nourishes them (the Eucharist), none of the Sacraments is properly administered. This is why (if time allows), I like to bless the anointing oil again and as I say the

Prayer Blessing to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit, I make the sign of the **Cross** over the oil – and the people respond: Blessed be God, who heals us in Christ! That might be something you could watch out for the next time you witness one of the seven **Sacrament** taking place – watch for the priest to make the sign of the **Cross**. The hand of God is active – always touching His **favorite creature** (you and I) – always giving us **blessings**. **St. Albert the** Great says that by the touch of our Lord's holy and Divine hands, Jesus confers on the matter (the bread) of the Sacrament (of the **Eucharist**) a power for all time to be transubstantiated into the Body of Christ; just as, when the Body of Christ went under the water at the Jordan River – all the waters of the Earth became holy! See, this is the reason Jesus had to be **baptized** – not because He needed to have His sins washed away (Jesus never sinned), but because our Lord was **baptizing the waters** – giving water the power to regenerate us, who have fallen into sin – we, who inherited Original



Sin. In Eucharistic Prayer I – there is what is called: *a twofold consecration*. The Cross is made over the bread and wine to show the prefiguring of the Cross on Good Friday at the Last Supper meal on Holy Thursday. And so the sign of the Cross is made at the consecration of the Host (Last Supper, Bread) and the sign of the Cross is made over the chalice (the Blood of Christ/ the bleeding that took place on the Cross). I am personally reminded of this every time I



celebrate the Mass with my chalice; for on, the base of the chalice is the image of our Lord at the Last Supper Table, and on the cup of the chalice is the image of our Lord on the Cross of Good Friday. They are one and the same sacrifice – it is just that the Last Supper Sacrifice is bloodless (blessing of the Host), while the Cross of Calvary is an overflowing of blood from the Sacred Heart of Jesus (blessing of the chalice).
