From the Gusset—Our Desert Path

Remember our Goal for Lent: to learn from our Lord, what it means to be called "God's beloved one." We go into the desert with our Lord, and we allow Jesus to teach us how to become "well pleasing to God." Now typically during Lent, we pay particular attention to our own sins – we seek to overcome temptations by the Lord's grace through our prayers, works, and fasting – and this is an admirable thing to do. The Prophet Isaiah says, "put away your misdeeds... cease doing evil." But Isaiah also says, focus on what God focuses on! When the Almighty turns his gaze upon us, what does God see? God does not focus on our sins, because God knows we are not *defined* by our sins; but rather, we are defined by God by our relationships with others? How does the **Prophet Isaiah** put it? The **Prophet** says, "make justice your aim... redress the wronged." You see, there it is! Are you and I in "right relationship" with God, with others, and with ourselves? Are we 'just?' Is God the most important **person** in our life? Do we have the **relationship** with God that we are His beloved one?! Are we honoring God and worshipping the Almighty on Sunday in the Mass? Are we who are religious or we who have made a vow with God – are



we honoring and worshipping God every day in the Mass? Are we trying to make our souls a worthy receptacle for God to pour all of His love into when we receive the Eucharist? Do we do things because they glorify our Lover (God)? Do we wish to hear at our particular judgment: "well done good and faithful servant, come share your Master's joy?" Do we try to make God glad that He chose to make us His beloved one? Are we in right relationship with our family members – especially our spouse, if we are married – especially our parents, if we are single? Do we act 'just' with the special people God has put in our lives: spouse, children, parents, brothers and sisters? Our previous sins against them have hurt them, and their previous sins against us have hurt us, so what are we doing during Lent to redress these wrongs? Above all, are we telling these people – our *Spiritual Twelve* (as Fr. Randy likes to call them) – are we telling them often that we love them? Finally, are we in right relationship, are we 'just' with ourselves? Do we thank God for our vocation and specifically ask for the graces of the Eucharist that we receive to live our vocation with joy and for God's honor and glory? You see, God's gaze is not on our sins when God looks at us, because our sins are not who the Almighty made us to be – our sins are who we have turned ourselves into? When God looks at us – He sees our relationship to others. So, when God looked at Adam, He saw Eve. When God looked at Cain, He saw Abel. When God looked at the Blessed Virgin Mary, He saw His Son. In Lent let us try to focus a little bit more, instead of on our sins – let us focus on our relationships and redress the wrongs we have committed against others by telling them we are sorry, that we forgive them, and most of all that we love them. COMMUNAL PENANCE SERVICE


APRIL 3RD, THURSDAY at 6:30pm

THE MASS AND THE SAINTS

Did you ever wonder why Fr. Randy must put on the Mass vestments to celebrate the Mass? Why is incense used in the Mass? Why are the consecration bells rung? Why did the Church insist that for almost two thousand years the Host be placed on our tongue? St. Antoninus a Dominican priest, who lived from 1389 to 1459 wrote his Summa Theologica discussing the fruits of the Eucharistic sacrifice and the meaning of why certain liturgical acts take place in the Mass. Antoninus proves that not only are St. Thomas Aquinas and St. Albert the

Great pretty smart cookies, but that the Dominicans just have a knack for understanding the symbolism in the Catholic Mass. St. Antoninus said that when the meal was prepared for Isaac—all his senses were deceived except for the sense of hearing. For Isaac's sight, which had grown dim, did not perceive Jacob in front of him; his power of smell perceived the fragrance of Esau's garments, not of Jacob's; his taste suppose that he was eating food prepared by Esau, not by Jacob; his sense of touch was deceived, for the hands were the hands of Esau, because of the goat skins with which his arms were covered. Only hearing was not misled, for Isaac said, the voice is the voice of Jacob. So in this Sacrament of the Eucharist the taste, the smell, the sight, and the touch perceive the accidents of bread just as they were; but hearing is not deceived! For when we hear the words: this is My Body—we truly believe that It is the Body of Christ! Fr. Randy wears the Mass vestments, because that is what our Lord wore at the Last Supper. I use incense to cover the smell of my cologne, so that God the Father looking down from Heaven smells instead His only Begotten Son – the sweet-smelling

Sacrifice. The **consecration** bells are rung to symbolize that the Angels see Jesus come to earth once again! We are not allowed to examine the **Eucharist** with our hands – feeling It – touching It – perhaps even breaking It – in order to examine It; rather, the **Eucharist** is placed on our tongue – as **the porridge** that Jacob prepared for Isaac could not be distinguished from the recipe that **Esau** prepared for his father! The bread and wine are changed into the Flesh and Blood by the **power** of the Word.
