#### From the Gusset—Easter Freedom



Give us the Easter Freedom that we have been seeking: the Freedom to love You, our God, with all our heart, and the Freedom to experience Your great love for us in the Eucharist of the Mass. Amen.



### **DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY**

We will work a Plenary Indulgence for Divine Mercy Sunday by praying the Chaplet before each Mass. Of course, the hard part in the working of any Indulgence is our going to Confession. Here is an examination of conscience, which prompts us to ask ourselves the question: Why do I sin? See, if this doesn't help you to be contrite, to confess your sins, and inspire you to do penance.

- Sometimes I sin, because I want something that God has no intention of giving me.
- I sin, because I want something I don't need or even because I want something that is bad for me.

PILGRIMS

• I know my vocation from God – how I am to

imitate Jesus with my life, but I sin, because I want to do what I want to do; <u>not</u> what Jesus would do.

- I sin, because I have the power to do good, but fail to do the good in my life.
- I sin, because I fail to see how much God loves me.
- I sin, because I fail to hear Jesus say, "I love you," in the Mass.
- I sin when I am stingy with the love God has given me in the Eucharist.
- I sin when I fail to make a Spiritual Communion for others.
- I sin, because I still don't understand the purpose of my life. The purpose of my life is to make myself *a worthy receptacle* for Jesus to pour all of His love into when I receive the Eucharist.



### THE MASS AND THE SAINTS

God loves mathematics! There are so many numbers in the Mass. Remember, math is just another language that God speaks to show us the dept of His love for us. St. Albert the Great, in talking

about the fractioning of the Celebrant's Host in the Mass – talks about how one fraction of the Host is eaten by the priest, who stands as the person of Christ in the Mass – this part of the Host represents the part of the Mystical Body of Christ that is already in Heaven – the Saints – who have passed wholly into Christ. The second part of the Host is put into the chalice, for the chalice signifies the sufferings of this life (the Passion our Lord endured in this world) – so this part of the Host represents you and I – the part of the Body of Christ still laboring amid earthly pains. The third part of the Host remains on the altar and is to be received after the mysteries have been concluded, to denote those who are in the tombs – Purgatory – and who will one day be incorporated into Christ and live with Him forever! Note: how the priest winds up receiving all the parts of the Host. Since the priest, represents our Lord, Jesus consumes that first part of the Host – representing those in Heaven for Jesus is the one who can freely enter into His Father's presence (Heaven). The priest also consumes the second part of the Host – for truly the priest celebrates the Mass for all of his people (*Pro Populo Mass*) – whether they come to Mass or not. Finally, Jesus (through His priest) eats the third part of the Host – the part that represents the souls in Purgatory – for we all celebrate the Eucharist for our beloved dead, who it turns out, need the Sacrament more than we do! I would have to show you in a youtube video or you can come to our next RCIA meeting (April 15th), but with the thrice breaking of the bread – this means that the Host is broken into five pieces – this signifies the five wounds of our Lord on the Cross (see there is the Math in the Mass again). Numbers are all over the place in the Mass, and especially God's favorite number: three! The Lamb of God is prayed three times, because of the three-fold evil that surrounds us. There is evil that we have already perpetrated (for which we must grieve – we grieve our sins), and there is evil put before us by the Devil – temptations (for which we must fear) – these are sins, which we have not yet committed, but the Devil really wishes we would, and finally there is evil that prevents us from growing in grace – this is the evil we wish to be delivered from – the evil that we would commit the worst sin. And what is the worst sin you and I could commit? The worst sin is to not see (because the world, sin, and Satan have blinded us) how much God loves us! We pray: 'grant us peace, Lamb of God' – when we ask to be delivered from this sin. One last (for this column) fascinating fact about the old Latin Mass (Pre-Vatican II) is that 'the sign of Peace' was not offered in a Funeral Mass. Dom Gueranger says, the dead are no longer under the power of the keys of Holy Mother Church, She cannot give her deceased children peace – and neither can we, the living relatives of the deceased, offer our beloved dead peace. That is why it is so **critical** that we, the living, offer each other **peace** while we can – while we are all still **alive** – we wish to offer our brother and sister, our Mom and Dad, our spouse and our children, our neighbor and our enemy – we wish to offer them the peace of Jesus Christ now, because we will be unable to do so once death has separated us!
