

From the Gusset—Easter Freedom


Happy Easter! Happy Divine Mercy Sunday!! What is Divine Mercy? How is Divine Mercy different from regular mercy? Mercy is synonymous with love – St. Augustine says, that they are two sides of the same coin. We could think of love as being 'the heads' side of the coin,



and mercy as being 'the tails' side of the coin. St. Paul says, that God proves how much He loves us that while we were still sinners, God the Father sent His Son, Jesus, to die for us! (Romans 5:8) This is what we say in the Eucharistic Prayer every Sunday – though I especially like the way Eucharistic Prayer for Reconciliation I puts it: though we were lost and could not approach You, You (Lord God) loved us with the greatest love: for Your Son, who alone is just, handed Himself over to death, and did not disdain to be nailed for our sake to the *wood of the Cross.* (Isn't that so **beautiful**?) And so, **Divine Love** is when God **loves** us with the greatest love: a love that loves the unlovable! Remember in the Shallow Hal movie: Hal only fell in love with women, who were beautiful. If a girl wasn't a Super model, Hal never gave the girl a second glance. When Hal sees the little girl in the burn ward at the hospital, he finally gives his love to someone, who is not beautiful, but on the contrary – disfigured. See, that is how God **loves** us! God would give all of His **love** to me – a man, who has **disfigured** himself by sin – God would embrace a man, who is ugly and repulsive. God wants to love us more today than He did yesterday even if, we love Him less today than we did yesterday. Divine Mercy is that God wants not only to forgive us, before we ask Him for forgiveness, but Divine **Mercy** is that God the Father would send His Son to do **the penance** our **sins** deserve even before we would be willing to make any **amends** for **the damage** our **sins** have caused! Regular **mercy** is that when someone asks us to **forgive** them – then we **forgive** them. **Divine Mercy** is that we forgive someone their sins against us even if, they never ask us for forgiveness. Regular mercy is that we would allow someone to pay back to us a little bit of the damage their sins have caused us. **Divine Mercy** is that we would do **the penance** that their **sins** deserved, for them – so that they wouldn't have to make any amends! Do you see how by our going to the Sacrament of Reconciliation – how we allow God to show us His Divine Mercy? Yes, we do ask for


forgiveness in offending God's love and ask Him to pour more of His love into us. Yes, we do say we are sorry for our sins and ask for a penance to pray to make up for <u>some</u> of the damage our sins have caused to the Body of Christ. But by partaking of the Sacrament of Confession – we allow God to love us more today than He did yesterday – God shows us His Divine Love. By going to Confession – we allow God to not only forgive us, but we allow God to send His Son, Jesus, to do the penance our sins deserve – God shows us His Divine Mercy! Happy Easter! Happy Divine Mercy Sunday!!

EASTER *FREEDOM*

What is **EASTER** *FREEDOM*? I think in short – **EASTER** *FREEDOM* is the ability to do the things that God wants us to do with our life! Anyone can do what <u>they</u> want to do in life – it is not hard to do things that you enjoy doing. Remember Pete Rose? All he wanted to do was play baseball!



Charlie Hustle once said, "I'd walk through Hell in a gasoline suit to play a game of **baseball.**" Pete loved baseball, and so he became the greatest baseball player of all time. History is full of men and women, who did with their life – what they wanted to do with their life. But a Saint is someone who did with their life – what God wanted them to do. EASTER **FREEDOM** is all about embracing the vocation God gave us and then excelling at it. If you are a priest – EASTER FREEDOM is to celebrate the Sacraments for your people every day and allow our Lord to pour out all of His Divine Love into them, and even should a parishioner not wish to allow Jesus to die and rise from the dead for them (even if a parishioner never comes to Mass or wants to receive a Sacrament), the priest makes a Spiritual Communion for them! If you are married – EASTER FREEDOM is all about going to Mass every Sunday and receiving the Eucharist and then spending the next six days giving all of that love to your spouse, and should your **spouse** not be **Catholic** – or should your **spouse** not want to receive **the Sacraments** for themselves (especially the Eucharist and Reconciliation) – you would make a Spiritual Communion for them and you would do penance and make reparations for their sins, before you would even do penance and make reparations for your own sins. Finally, if you are single - EASTER FREEDOM is the ability to see Jesus in your parents and, in your brothers and sisters. The author to the letter to the Hebrews said, if we respect our earthly fathers who corrected us, should we not all the more submit to the Father of spirits, and live? (Hebrews 12:9) To be docile to those who have authority over us (parents, teachers, boss, **Bishop**...) is to imitate Jesus Christ – who even though He was in the form of God did not regard equality with God something to be grasped! (Philippians 2:6) To love your brothers and sisters as much as you love yourself is the second greatest Commandment! We have been given the

EASTER FREEDOM to spend these next fifty days seeking out God's love for us, and choosing to boldly do something different than the rest of the peoples in the world. Everyone out there is doing what <u>they</u> want to do – we choose to do what God wants us to do! That is EASTER FREEDOM!






THE MASS AND THE SAINTS

When we gather every Sunday in the Mass and receive Holy Communion, St. Thomas Aquinas thought that God becomes over-joyed! For the Sacrament of the Eucharist on earth, foreshadows the Banquet Feast that happens in Heaven. Remember, the greatest Parable (the Parable of the Prodigal Son) explains to us, how God the Father actually sees our partaking of Holy Communion. The father (in the Parable) saw his prodigal son finally returning home and the father could not even wait for his younger son to cross the threshold; such that, the father ran to meet his son! After a passionate embrace and many kisses were exchanged, the father instructs the servants to prepare a Feast – the fattened calf!! When the father becomes aware that

his other son has returned from working in **the field**, but has not entered the Feast – the father comes out to plead with the older son to come in and partake of the fattened calf!!! God the Father is **over-joyed** to celebrate the Banquet Feast in Heaven with His only Begotten Son, Jesus Christ, and all the brothers and sisters that the Son of God went and scoured the earth to bring back Home with Him!!!! Though it happens that many of our brothers and sisters no longer celebrate the Mass and receive the Eucharist with us every Sunday – we make a Spiritual **Communion** for them. When we make a **Spiritual Communion** for others, we are writing *the rough draft* of a <u>new</u> and <u>better</u> **Prodigal Son Parable**!!!! In making a **Spiritual Communion**, we are **promising** God the Father that He will experience great joy in His Kingdom when time ceases to be and Eternal Life has begun. For just as the Blessed Virgin Mary received a Spiritual Communion on the night of the Last Supper, so our brothers and sisters are sharing in the fruits and the benefits of Holy Communion – when we – their brother and their sister – make a **Spiritual Communion** for them!!!!!
