From the Gusset—Easter Freedom

For the bread of God is that which comes down from Heaven and gives life to the world. (John 6:33)

Happy Easter! Recognition is the sweetest grace of the New Testament. We are all trying to recognize God's true presence amongst us, and this recognizing God is not something new that only happens to us in the Easter season of the Year of Grace 2025, which, by the way, I must always point out to you: is a Jubilee

Year. This year, Easter is very special. Yet, recognizing God's presence in our life has always been the goal of mankind. I think that is why the Catholic Church gives us the Gospel of John **chapter 6** to read in its entirety in the 2nd and 3rd week of **Easter**. Because you see, the people are trying to recognize, who Jesus is. Is Jesus the Son of Man? Is Jesus God's Son? Is Jesus a **Prophet**? Is Jesus, Moses come back from the dead? The people are trying to discover recognize—who is it that just multiplied the loaves and fed the 5,000?! And so they say to themselves, the last time something like this happened—the last time a vast multitude was fed in a deserted place—was when **Moses** called down **bread** from **Heaven**—the manna. Now **Moses** just did not do it once, but every morning for 40 years—the dew evaporated on the desert floor and the manna could be harvested. So what do the people ask Jesus to do? 'Do it again! You fed us at Tiberius, now feed us today, on the other side of the lake.' Do you see what is going on here? God allows us, human beings, to choose the means or the way that we want God to become evident to us. We get to choose how we will recognize God!! Remember Adam?! Adam said, "OK, yeah I know you are God. You created all these trees and fruit bearing plants and animals for me, a man; but I will recognize you as God, if you make me a wife!" The next thing you know, Adam opens his eyes and he sees Eve. You see that?! God is always giving us what we ask for! The people ask for bread. 'Give us bread to eat Jesus, and we will believe You are the Son of God.' Jesus says, My Father does not give bread—My Father is so much more than a baker. No, Jesus says, God gives Life! Eve is God's gift of Life to Adam. The man wanted a wife—God gave Adam, Eve. The Israelites wanted bread in the desert they were hungry, they were going to starve to **death**, so God gave them *manna*, food—food that gave them Life! What is it that the people of John chapter 6 really want? What is it that you and I really want? We want Jesus to give us the Eucharist! The true bread that comes down from Heaven and gives Life to the world! Do you recognize that? Do you recognize that Jesus is the Bread of Life? That whoever comes to the Catholic Mass will never hunger—will never thirst—will never die; rather, whoever comes to Jesus will be given the greatest gift—the gift mankind has always been wanting—the gift of Life! And not just regular get up, go to work, eat, play, suffer, and go back to bed life; the Eucharist gives us a Life lived in God's presence! The Eucharist is the Easter Freedom we have seeking all along—to love God with all our heart, mind, soul, and strength and to experience God's love for us in the Eucharist of the Mass!

THE MASS AND THE SAINTS

Ite, Missa est. The final words of the Mass. "The Mass is ended." The whole ceremony of the Paschal Lamb or the ceremony of consecrating the Eucharist is called Missa, 'the sending.' For did not Jesus tell us that He was sent by the Father. The Lord came from Heaven to earth—sent by the



Father to rescue us from sin and death. St. John Fisher said, 'the living Victim (Jesus) is sent **down** to us from **Heaven** by the Father.' Other Theologians have define the word **Missa** to mean sending across, since the prayers and the oblations are sent across from the people to God through the priest. And remember who the priest is in the Mass—the priest is the one who plays the part of a mediator between man and God; that is, the priest is Jesus Christ in the Mass. Still others think that the word *Missa* can be defined as a *sending back*, since when the **Mass** is done the Lord Jesus Christ *ascends back* to the right hand of His Father, and we the people are sent back to our homes! Remember when Jesus cured the man from the territory of the Gerasenes, who was possessed by a legion of demons? The man had been dwelling among the tombs, and no one could restrain him any longer, even with a chain. In fact, he had frequently been bound with shackles and chains, but the chains had been pulled apart by him and the shackles smashed, and no one was strong enough to subdue him. Night and day, St. Mark tells us, the man wandered about the tombs on the hillside crying out and bruising himself with stones. Well, when Jesus finally cures him—drives the demons out, the man wanted to go with Jesus and the disciples—he wanted to get into the boat with them. But Jesus would not permit him, but told him instead, "go home to your family and announce to them all that the Lord in His pity has done for you." The scripture says the man went off and began to proclaim in the Decapolis (the 10 cities) what Jesus had done for him; and all were amazed! Indeed, we have been *sent back* by Jesus through our **priest**—we are *sent back* to our homes after the Mass, and our lives are completely changed! God is now inside of us through our reception of Holy Communion, and although we go back to the same house and to the <u>same</u> people (our <u>family members</u> are the same who did <u>not</u> come to <u>Mass</u> with us: the sick



are still sick, the angry are still angry, those confused by sin are still just as confused), but we have changed and so has our perspective on everything changed; because of what Jesus did for us in the Mass. The word Missa means to send - Missa is a sending across, a sending out, a sending down, and a sending back! You and I, we want to go to Mass, so that Jesus can send us! For don't we hear through the Prophet, the voice of the Lord said, 'whom shall I send?' Here I am; I said, send me!
