

Happy Easter! Our final (official)
Sunday of the Easter season –
Pentecost Sunday – finds Fr.
Randy learning a new definition of
Heaven. Coming out of my
meditations for the Solemnity of
the Ascension: Heaven is where
God the Father is! In our Lord's
Last Supper discourse, St. John
tells us, Jesus raised his eyes to
heaven.... Why does Jesus raise
His eyes to Heaven? Because that

is where His Father is! Jesus is talking to His Father in **Heaven**, the Lord says, **Father the hour** has come – give your give glory to Your Son, so that Your Son, Jesus, may glorify You! We go back to the most important Parable in Sacred Scripture. I always say, if we lost every word of Sacred Scripture except the Prodigal Son Parable (Luke 15), we could still grope around in the dark, stumble Home, find our way back into Heaven! We focus on the older son in the Parable, because if you are reading this Gusset column – the older son is you! The older son is full of resentment at his younger brother's actions and irritated by how his father is so lavish in welcoming the sinner home – he refuses to enter the house. What is the house in the Parable? The house is **Heaven**, because **Heaven** is where God the Father is! **Heaven** is where **the repentant sinner**, the prodigal son, has returned home to after **reconciling** with the Father. Heaven is where our brothers and sisters, who left home – left the path that leads to Heaven at one point in their life, left the Catholic Church, but now they have come to their senses. Are those not the words that **St. Luke** uses in the Parable: *coming to his senses*! The younger son thought to himself, *I shall get up and go to my father*. Where is the father? The father is at home, the Father is in Heaven – I will get up and go to Heaven – I shall return to live with Dad! What if...? What if the older son, you and I, coming in from the field, hearing the sound of music and dancing, calling the servant and learning of our brother's return – what if, the older son went straight into the Feast? What if the older son didn't make his father come out and plead with him? What if you and I are present at the Feast of the fattened calf – what if we are present to share in the Feast thrown for our younger brother? I'll tell you, what if? If you stay in the Catholic Church – stay home – stay in the Father's house on earth (the Catholic Church) God will glorify you!! Jesus said it Himself in the Gospel: Father, everything You have, You have given to Me. What belongs to Jesus Christ was given to Him by His Heavenly Father. Doesn't the Dad, in your favorite Parable and mine, say to the older son, "Son, you are here (at home) with me always, everything I have is yours. My prodigal son has returned home. I, your Father, give you your brother as a gift – come to the Feast!" The Feast is the Mass – the Feast is the Eucharist! Happy Easter! **Yours on the Path** Fr. Randy



MISSIONARY PREIST

WELCOME Fr. Benjamin Asibuo Kusi

The great Solemnity of Pentecost will find Fr.

Benjamin Asibuo Kusi as our Missionary priest telling us about his native Diocese of Goaso! Fr.

Benjamin is a convert from the Methodist

Church, who was ordained on July 12th in 2003!

Father's first parish was named Our Lady of Perpetual Help! He has had many, many titles including Pastor of several Churches, Diocesan

Chaplain of Catholic Charismatic Renewal, Chaplain of non-Catholic High Schools, Vocation Director, and Spiritual Director and member of the Board of Our Lady of the Holy Spirit Center – where he visits the sick, gives the anointing Sacrament, and hears confessions. Besides being deeply in love with his vocation from God, Fr. Asibuo Kusi is continually sharpening the saw as he recently (2018) obtained a Master of Arts Degree in Philosophy! Just one of the fascinating things about the Diocese of Goaso-Ghana in West Africa is that it is a very new Diocese. Created by Pope St. John Paul the great in 1997. The Diocese of Goaso was part of the Diocese of Sunyani and still enjoys its first and only Bishop, the Most Rev. Peter K. Atuahene – installed February 8th in 1998! Goaso has a population of 700,150 – of which 66,822 are Catholics. Starting with only 11 parishes and 20 Diocesan priests – today, the Diocese boasts of its 81 priests! The Diocese has many schools including: 78 Kindergarten, 82 Basic Schools (Grades 1-6), 43 Junior High Schools, 1 Girls' Senior High School, and St. Joseph's College of Education. The Diocese has provided two hospitals, two maternity and health centers to complement the Government's efforts in providing healthcare for the people, especially in the rural areas. Bishop Peter has stated that, "now with some of the basic infrastructure in place our next step is to speed up pastoral and social activities with emphasis

on the youth and children who are our hope for the future." That said, the main works of the Diocese of Goaso is providing quality education and efficient health care. Most of the Diocese is in rural areas with limited socio-economic infrastructure. This means that some worship takes place in open areas with no Church buildings and some schools have leaky roofs. Another danger is that the fresh water supply can become polluted as a result of the activities of illegal small scale mining, which has become a major problem in Ghana. The people are very dependent on the Catholic Church for help. Your generosity will go a long way in helping Fr. Benjamin's Diocese of Goaso!



THE MASS AND THE SAINTS

God is Himself the source of every good thing that comes to us. For this reason, St. Vincent Ferrer thought that we should make some offering back to God. Indeed, from the very beginning, it has been this way – God willed that all men should offer sacrifice. This is why Cain and Abel both made an offering (a sacrifice) to God. Turns out that the Mass is the sacrifice, which God the Son makes to His Heavenly Father; and because the Lord is so intimate with us – Jesus wants us to participate in the sacrifice to God the Father that He makes. And so, the Mass, according to St. Alphonsus Liguori, the great Redemptorist, (the Redemptorists are the ones instructed by the Holy Father to make Our Lady of Perpetual Help known to the world!) – St. Alphonsus thought the sacrifice of the Mass has four



ends! To honor God. To satisfy our sins (make reparations). To thank God for His benefits. And finally: to obtain **Divine Grace**. The Mass is the same sacrifice that was once offered on Calvary, with the difference, that on Calvary the blood of Jesus Christ was really shed, but on the altar it is shed only in a mystical, unbloody way! The Son, Jesus, always honors His Father



- Jesus is not like the **prodigal son** nor is our Lord like **the older son** – Jesus always does the will of His Father. Since we **sin** every day, Christ is **mystically** offered for us each day – that is why **Fr. Randy** and every other **Catholic priest** must celebrate **the Mass** every day – even on our day-off. The **sacrifice** of **the Mass** is offered to show God that we are grateful for all the gifts He has given us – like **Cain** and **Abel**, we offer some **sacrifice** back to God as a way to thank the Almighty



for giving us our vocation. And finally, we obtain grace every time we celebrate the Mass. Grace gives us the strength to live our lives doing the Father' will. As the great Act of Contrition of St. Francis De Sales says: Lord, reign over me, that my will would only be a reflection of Your will. Thy will be done by me on earth, O Lord and Master, just as Your angels and Saints do Your will in Heaven.
